Master Campers Program – 2010

Again we find ourselves blessed enough to wake up on the shores of Lake Webb in the wilderness of Tumbledown, ready to start another fantastic summer--the water is cool, the sun is shining, and the campers are chomping at the bit to get to their activities. Helping to lead some of those activities will be a great crew of Master Campers (MCs). These young men will be working together and with staff members to make the difficult transition from camper to staff leaders.

Kawanhee has always been a place steeped in traditions and lead by outstanding staff.: "Finish what you start," "The big 'R'--responsibility," "Follow the Golden Rule," and "Learn to do by doing," are phrases that have been etched into the minds of countless campers and staff over the past ninety summers as Kawanhee has endeavored to mold young boys into the gentlemen of tomorrow. Over the course of the next seven weeks, the MCs will come to better understand and apply these traditions to their lives, thereby aiding a new generation of Kawanheeans.

The MCs will spend the first few weeks attending regular activities during the day, and attending weekly meetings where they will learn the ins and outs of leading a lodge, taking care of campers, and teaching their selected activities. During subsequent weeks, they will spend time working in at least three different activities while continuing to refine their instruction skills under the tutalage of trained staff members. They will also begin to share meals and attend activities with a designated lodge. During the final week of the season, they will move in with a lodge, and assist the counselors with daily lodge duties.



As Chief Kawanhee calls his tribe to serve others, MCs will also work on both personal and public service projects. At the moment, there are plans for the MCs to help repair current Kawanhee outposts and to serve in the Weld community. Through service to Kawanhee and to others, the MCs will learn to take pride in their surroundings, which they will have had a part in improving.

opportunities out on the ropes course in 2010. Built in 2000 with the support of the George and Raymond Frank Foundation, the Kawanhee ropes course has always tried to provide campers with a means both to physically and mentally challenge themselves, and test their personal limits. But as in every activity, the main goal is to facilitate a healthy, safe, and outdoor experience that is pure fun. The Kawanhee Yacht Club/Badger/Crow's Nest building, the waterfront home to our sailing program and our 15 year-old campers, boasts fresh red cedar shingles, a crow's nest balcony, a handhewn cedar railing along the catwalk, some new doors and windows, a newly constructed staircase and a fresh coat of paint on all the trim-work. The early reviews, including those



from our sailing master, Rees Tulloss, and our very discerning 15 year-olds, have been extremely favorable.
