

THE GOING OF THE CHIEF

On Thursday evening, August 10th, the annual Kawanhee ceremony, "The Going of the Chief", was held. As darkness fell, all campers assembled by lodge out at the Council Point. Chief Sachem, Ted Simanek, called for the Chief three times. Chief Kawanhee appeared out of the woods to begin the ceremony. Each lodge had picked a representative or "sachem" to write a message to the campers of 2001 on how to gain a positive experience at camp. Each sachem took turns reading the message; and as always, it was filled with great advice. After the reading of the message, it was buried next to the campfire where it will remain until the Coming of the Chief next summer.

At that point of the ceremony, the main fire was lit by an arrow from the sky. Then each sachem lit their smaller lodge fires, which surrounded the main fire. Chief Kawanhee gave a speech on the many important things we have taken from Kawanhee -- friendships, a love of nature, a caring for other people, and a compassion for life. The ceremony ended with the playing of "Taps" as the Chief disappeared into the woods, and the campers quietly left the Council Ring.



TYING UP THE ROPES by Kris Simanek

The Ropes Course and Climbing Wall Program was met with tremendous success for its inaugural season. The installation of this program was made possible largely in part by the Abbott family, who had made a generous donation in the memory of Jack Abbott, Sr.. We owe great thanks to this family and hope that we can continue to provide meaningful experiences to campers and staff in honor of Mr. Abbott.

The campers and staff were able to experience an array of activities on the course that included: team building initiatives and group games; high climbing challenges; as well as, learning the techniques and skills necessary to operate the course. 

It requires shooting 40 targets (5 bull's eye targets), 10 in each position (prone, sitting, kneeling, and standing), with near perfect accuracy. The targets must then be sent to NRA for verification before the medal and certificate can be awarded. These three young men are to be commended for their efforts. Congrats to Enrique Alvarez-Sala for earning the "Distinguished Rifleman" award.

ARCHERY SEASON ON TARGET

Archery completed an awesome season during which Kawanhee archers earned a total of 573 medals and 20 Robin Hood awards. Highlights of the season included: the 5th straight championship of the Caribou Invitational Tournament; a pizza party for the ladder leaders; and the final awards ceremony.

Our ladder leaders at the end of the season were: Spencer Davis with a score of 242 from 15 meters; Dan Alexander with a score of 232 from 20 meters; Jose Martinez-Pereda and Jeff Cavanagh with a score of 250 from 30 meters; Max Smith-Marder with 214 and James Forbes with 229 from 40 meters; and Enrique Alvarez-Sala with 201 from 50 meters and 189 from 60 meters.

In addition, we had many exciting moments during the shooting for the Robin Hood awards. To qualify to shoot a Junior C Robin Hood, a camper must have completed all eight medals at 15 and 20 meters, and must shoot a total of 400 points from 15 and 20 meters with only 60 arrows. Those earning this award were: Clay Colonna, Quinn Kielbasa, Jose Martinez-Pereda, and Spencer Davis. Junior B Robin Hood candidates must have earned all medals at 15, 20, and 30 meters and the first medal at 40 meters. To earn the actual Robin Hood trophy, the archer must shoot a total of 90 arrows from 20, 30, and 40 meters and accumulate 500 points. Those awarded this trophy Trevor Branch, Tim were: Alvarez-Sala, Mario Cadwallader, Chris Engel, Geoff Fay, Gregor Hoffman, Dan Luken, Andrew MacMannis, and Max Smith-Marder.

The Junior A Robin Hood is earned by completing all the medals through the 50 meter line, and shooting 90 total arrows from 30, 40, and 50 meters for a score of 500. Junior A Robin Hoods for the 2000 season were: Ben Colonna, Jeff Cavanagh, Matt Duncan, and Matt Fortunato. The Senior Robin Hood is shot from 40, 50, and 60 meters for a final score of 500. Two C.I.T.'s, James Chagaris and Scott Luken, earned the Senior Robin Hood.

The prestigious Olympic Robin Hood award is similar to the Senior Robin Hood; however, the total points earned must be 600. This year, Archery J.C., James Forbes, shot and earned this award.

No matter what the age level, it has been terrific watching all the campers progress this summer. Thanks to our able J.C.'s, Chris Proctor and James Forbes, as well as our C.I.T.'s, James Chagaris, Frank Cook, and Rajiv Miller, for helping to make this such a productive and fun summer! 
