The Impossible Accomplished

As Kawanhee opened its fifty-second season, a nearly impossible task of construction and expansion was completed by John Detrick, Assistant Director and Head Counselor, with the valuable assistance of Jeff Monroe, Doug Means, Fritz Monroe, Bill Jones, Kevin Morrin, and Scott Getty. Between June 14 and June 27, the first day of camp, a period of only twelve days, the rear portion of the kitchen was demolished, then expanded and rebuilt.

"Big John", assisted by a force of ten willing counselors and Inn staff members, worked ten and twelve hour days to complete the project; this remarkable group effort proceeded during varying and often wet weather and involved every stage of carpentry, roofing, wiring, and concrete foundation work. Because of a record-breaking enrollment of 160 campers, the expansion was a necessity for efficient kitchen operation; Chef Leonard Taylor's kitchen is regarded as Headquarters of Morale and Well-Being during the summer, and rightly so — the offerings in the Kawanhee Dining Hall are of a legendary excellence.

Local plumbers and utility men cooperated in marvelous style, though a few of them were skeptical about the possibility of completing the new kitchen on time; Detrick and Company progressed with great resolve, however, inspired early by Doug Means' great work with sledge and wrecking bar. Flora Burgess, our expert pastry cook who was on the scene early enough to experience the full measure of disarray in her baking pantry, said that she was never really concerned about the completion of things; she's thoroughly enthusiastic about the new quarters and is currently turning out an endless selection of her well-known pies and cakes. Chef Leonard Taylor, who arrived later, said that he'd never seen anything like it; "I feel a banquet ought to be given for John Detrick and his workers. I really do."

Captains Chosen For 1972

Saturday camp fires are dominated by the tally of the competition for points between the Greys and the Maroons, the two teams which strive for final supremacy through the summer. The captains this year are Ralph Tice, Columbus, Ohio, for the Greys, and Tim Keny, Upper Arlington, Ohio, for the 1971 Champion Maroons. Both leaders are veterans of Kawanhee, and both are coincidentally wrestlers of some distinction. Keny, who has been rising early to run several miles each morning to hone himself into shape, is cautiously optimistic; Tice, the leading point scorer in 1970, is quite determined and feels that the competition will be extremely close, with accomplishment of levels providing the final margin of difference. Since every boy in camp is chosen for one of the two teams, enthusiasm is high, cresting as the week's accumulated score is read at the camp fire.
