The date was August 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1970, and we had just completed the 50th anniversary season at Camp Kawanhee. Three children and many life experiences later I found myself contacting my old camper friend Mark Standen. I asked him how the camp was faring and he said quite well. In fact he was anticipating a banner year with over 75% of last year's campers returning. That's remarkable I said, especially in light of the stalled world economy where many camps were faced with lack of enrollment, that Kawanhee was continuing the tradition now in its 90th year! I explained that after working in the city I had bought a farm in

upstate New York in 1993 and raised three children. They grew up helping with the planting of the seeds in the greenhouse as well as putting in transplants in the field. When they were old enough to count they even helped run the farm stand. Now I was faced with having my two oldest leave the farm to pursue their careers. # **Kayaking Update**

As the Kawanhee season pushes off, we are pleased with all the excitement on the waterfront. Kayaking has had a good first week and the kids have been out on the water doing their kayak tests. For those who don't know, the kayak test requires the kids to flip over while in their boat, remove their spray skirt, and then exit the boat, all while under water. It is encouraging to see so many brave boys fight the natural phobia of being upside down and underwater in a kayak.



This Friday we have our first roll clinic. The aim of these clinics and the department is to prepare the kids for kayaking on rivers. This summer we are attempting to run at least one river trip a week in order to increase the kids river experience and their whitewater paddling skills. Thus far we have our sights set on the Androscoggin for week two, the Sheepscot tidal waves for week three, and an overnight trip to the Penobscot for week four. These trips are for the older boys (usually 12 and up) who show an interest in kayaking and come out to learn their Eskimo role (the ability to right the boat when it flips over). These river trips will not only increase the kids kayaking skills, but they will also teach them about river features, river safety, and river signals. All of these areas of knowledge are important for any type of activity that is done on rivers including fishing, canoeing, and whitewater rafting.

Dave Ruhle joins me in the department this year after a five year hiatus from camp. Dave was one of the



few people to earn his whitewater kayak level as a camper. He has been paddling all his life and spent a post graduate year at New River Academy where he perfected a lot of his skills. Dave brings expertise and talent to the department that I am not able to give to the kids, and I hope to get him teaching those tricks and advanced maneuvers. We also owe thanks to Mark "Gibby" Gibson, Ben Connelly, and Scott Barnes. Gibby is a good paddler himself and has proposed our overnight trip to the Penobscot. Ben was a counselor in kayaking before being D.O.A, is very supportive of the

activity, helping to move us to the position we are in now. Scott Barnes every year is a huge asset to everything on water. He is an authority for any questions regarding kayaking and rivers and helps oversee the program. We hope to move forward and keep it safe and fun on the river this year.
