

Our relationship with the Rock

It majestically juts out of the water three-quarters of a mile from the shores of Camp Kawanhee. It is much closer to Mount Blue State Park than Kawanhee, but we have always had a strong relationship with Bass Rock. I don't know much about its formation. Lake Webb is a glacial lake and perhaps Bass Rock is part of the debris that the glacial period left in Maine after the last glacier receded. I guess it is not important, the important thing is that it's there.

From the earliest days of Kawanhee, Bass Rock was used for several purposes. I'm sure they swam to and from it just as we do today. But, from an historical perspective, the most noteworthy use of Bass Rock in the 1920s and 1930s was to meet at Bass Rock for Sunday evening vespers services. Vespers was a mostly religious service held at the conclusion of the weekend. The entire camp would canoe to the rock. The canoes would straddle the rock and Kawanhee's chaplain or perhaps RC or GR Frank would run the vespers service from Bass Rock itself. Kawanhee has several great pictures of this event and one is on the wall of the museum and I use one in my "History of Kawanhee" slide show that I present to the camp population before the "Coming of the Chief "ceremony. In early camp publications, it is even referred to as 'Vespers Rock'. The Bass Rock vespers services disappeared as camp got bigger and bigger.

In the modern age of Kawanhee, Bass Rock is used for several purposes. Some lodges use it as a place to go for their lodge vespers services-this happens the first and last Sun-

day of camp. The major use of Bass Rock is to use it as a great swimming accomplishment for advanced swimmers. This usually happens late in the summer as an organized activity. If a boy can swim the three-quarters of a mile he earns a maroon "K" on his Kawanhee canoe paddle. Bass Rock is also used as the starting part for our annual Kawanhee Triathlon .

The most unique use of Bass Rock is to walk the three- quarters of a mile in winter. You can do this anytime the lake is frozen. Camp now organizes a walk in February. In New England , schools are off from school the week of President's Day, so the walk is scheduled the Sunday before the holiday. We all meet for dinner the night before and take the walk the next day. It's a wonderful tradition and gives us all a taste of camp in mid-winter. We've had people come from far away to take the walk. By taking the walk a Kawanheean can earn a white "K" on his paddle. Information about the winter

- 10. What is the oldest football bowl game?


