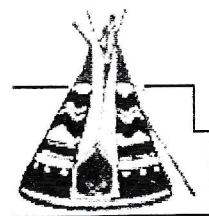

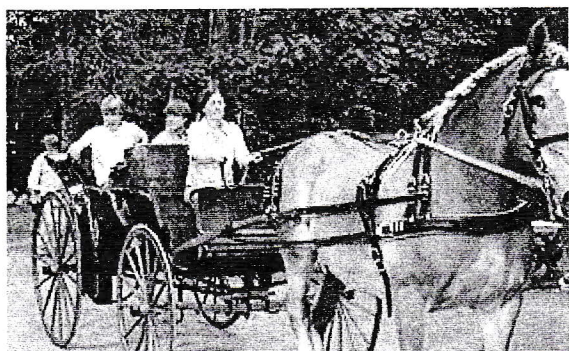

MAROONS CLAIM VICTORY IN 2004

In one of the friendliest Maroon - Grey team competitions in Kawanhee's history, the Maroons edged out the Greys 67,085 to 60,014. Shortly after Maroon Captain, Adam Aldrich, and Grey Captain, Will Dargusch, gave reflective and emotional speeches to the awards ceremony crowd, the camp score keeper, B.A. Altmaier, took over.

B.A. quickly revealed that the total amount of points scored would eclipse 125,000. People knew it was going to be an exciting process to find out the score. B.A. called up different Kawanhee personalities and alumni to put up additional numbers. Finally the last number was delivered in a handsome 1890's velvet horse drawn carriage, courtesy of the Simanek family, and seated in back were the very best of friends -Adam and Will- with the secret envelope containing the final number.

Once B.A. received this, he hid the scoreboard as he put on the final digit. Everyone waited in tense anticipation. Finally the score was revealed, and the Maroons celebrated. At the conclusion of this portion, we all made the trek to Council Point, beautifully illuminated by the Bear Lodge gang, and took our seats in eager anticipation of the commencement. Chief Sachem, Ted Simanek, called for the Chief three times, and Chief Kawanhee appeared out of the woods to begin the ceremony. Each lodge had picked a representative or "sachem" to write a message to the campers of 2005 on how to gain a positive experience at camp. Each sachem took turns reading the message, which was filled with great advice. After the reading of the message, it was buried next to the campfire where it will remain until the Coming of the Chief next summer.

At that point in the ceremony, the main fire was lit by an arrow from the sky. Then each sachem lit their smaller lodge fires, which surrounded the main fire. Chief Kawanhee gave a speech on the many important things we have taken from Kawanhee; which include: friendships, a love of nature, a caring for other people, and a compassion for life. The ceremony ended with the playing of "Taps" as the Chief disappeared into the woods. We all quietly left the Council Circle.

KAWANHEE ARCHERY WRAPS UP A SUCCESSFUL SEASON

KAWANHEE'S FLYFISHING SCHOOL OUTING by John Bell

We made our seventh annual trip to Upper Dam in the Rangeley region Tuesday, July 27th. It was graduation day for Kawanhee's Flyfishing School students. With fair skies and high hopes, seven stalwarts and three staff set-out for the fabled waters after lunch.

Upper Dam is one of a series of five dams that comprise a water storage system within the Rangeley Lakes group and their connecting rivers. This system ultimately regulates the flow of the mighty Androscoggin River, as it was originally designed to do by the timber barons and industrialists of the nineteenth century. Built by laborers in the mid 1850's, Upper Dam was quite a feat of engineering for that time. Now bolstered with concrete and steel, it continues to hold back the waters of Mooselookmeguntic, and hosts impressive (yet ever-fluctuating and nearly always discriminating) numbers of salmon and brook trout below, on the Upper Richardson Lake side. Upper Dam, where the famous Gray Ghost fly was devised by Carrie Stevens in the 1920's, is best approached by fishermen (whether novice or experienced) with reverence, modest expectations characterized by a sort of humble optimism, and a philosopher's serene resignation to the whims of fate.

There were no swarms of willing salmonids awaiting us that particular day, but a few fish came to hand. All of the Kawanhee flyfishers came to this historic site with the right attitude. Everyone had a great time tempting these savvy fish with flies of all types, pausing now and again to watch the opeys and bald eagles that nest nearby. We will continue to return to Upper Dam, not because the fishing is amazing, but for what it has to teach about the proper perspective on one's fishing. To stand knee deep in the pristine currents between two of Maine's most spectacular and unspoiled lakes; to know these magnificent fish are there and to have the chance enjoyed by few to try for them, is a privilege – a rare experience where the catching of fish is almost incidental. Almost.....We'll get them next year.

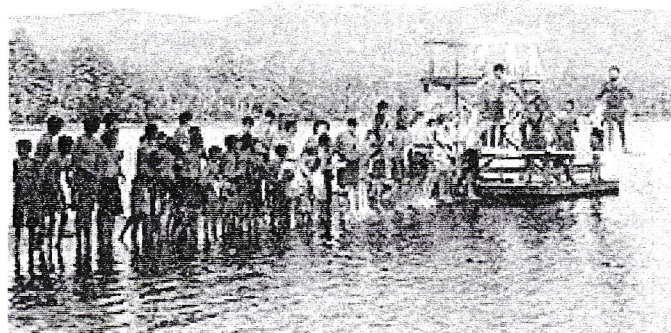
THOUGHTS ON KAWANHEE by Trevor Branch

KAWANHEE MEANS A LOT TO ME by Spencer Branch

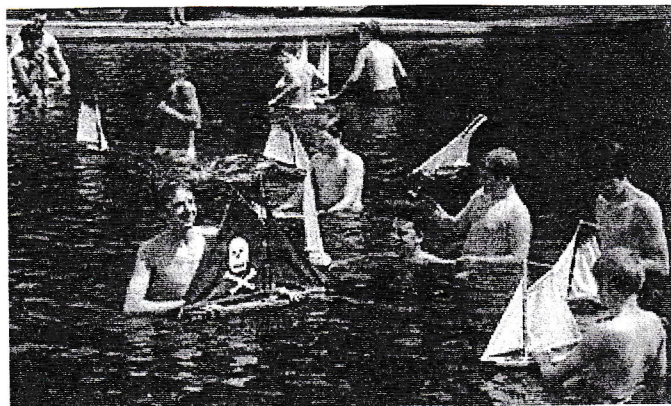

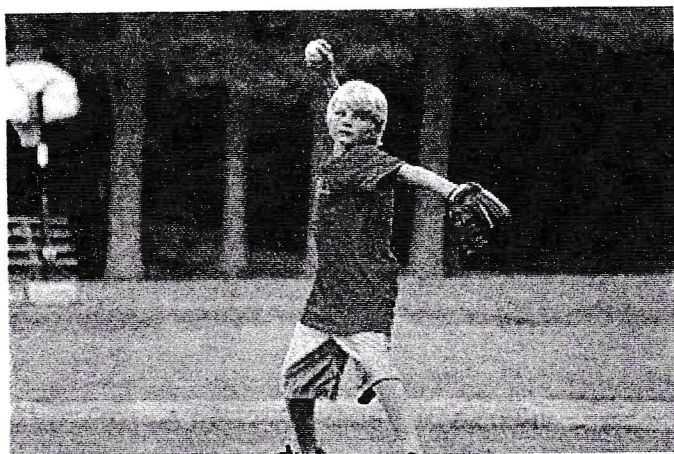

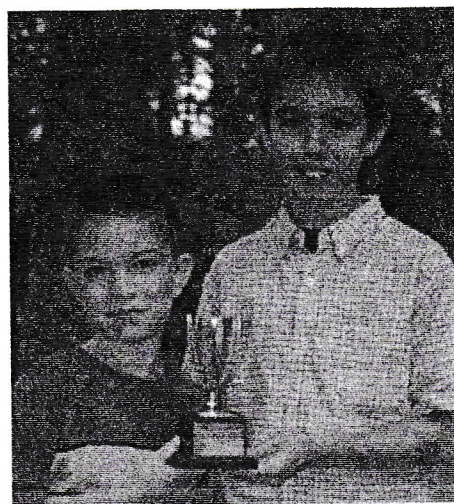

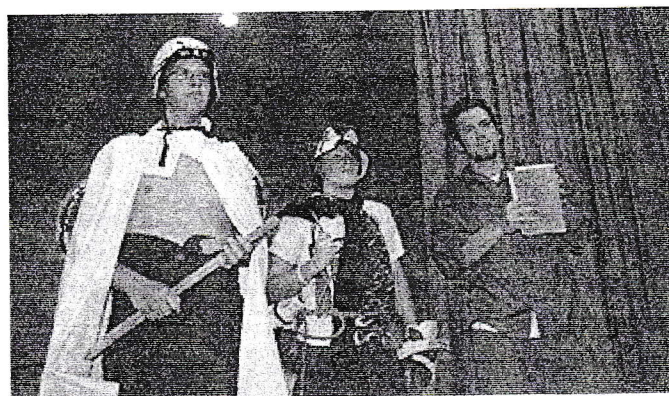

Kawanhee was fortunate to receive a generous gift from Carl and David's grandmother, Muriel Ruhle, which will provide for a JMG training outpost on the newly acquired land across the lake from camp. This land includes Skookamee Beach and the area where Kawanhee's JMG training has taken place for many years. Mrs. Ruhle's gift was given in memory of her son, Tom Ruhle, who was a camper and counselor in the 1970's.

"THREE WAYS TO GIVE BACK TO KAWANHEE"

Eighty-four years ago two visionary, young school teachers dared to dream and to create a place where boys could become young men. Their vision would be a camp where boys would be challenged every day to excel and to try something new in the rich setting of western Maine. The Frank Brothers' endeavor was passed on to the Estabrook family, whose extraordinary stewardship led Kawanhee into the new millennium. Now Camp Kawanhee has been passed on to the George and Raymond Frank Foundation. The purpose of this non-profit charitable foundation is to ensure that the traditions and mission of Camp Kawanhee last forever. The Foundation's charge is to provide every resource necessary for our staff to help grow boys into men. Your Board of Trustees has been blessed to inherit this wonderful task but our success rests solely on the support of all of the campers, staff, alumni and friends of Kawanhee. In this ever-changing world, we know that we need a financial foundation to ensure that Kawanhee lasts forever.

This financial foundation is created by a legacy of generosity which stretches from those two brothers to our present day contributions and revenues. We want to keep our tuition as low as possible, our equipment as good and modern as need be, our people properly compensated. We are asking you to participate in this foundation building in three ways.

The Annual Campaign

In every Wigwam or camp catalog is an envelope in which we invite everyone to send a check which will be directed toward the annual operating budget. Suggested amounts are between \$50 and \$5,000, but donors are welcome to select a different amount too. The purpose of the annual campaign is to support ongoing programs, pay for small capital purchases and keep tuition in line. Many Kawanhees have committed to participate every year, but we need every Kawanhee donor and every dollar to fulfill our mission. Therefore we ask everyone to do something and do it annually.

A Capital Campaign

From time to time special circumstances will arise and we must step forward to meet the challenge. Such an opportunity has indeed presented itself. Across from the splendid cove where we have harbored for 84 years sits Skookamee Beach. This past year that land became available for purchase. The Board of Trustees felt it was important to secure camp's environment and ensure that our shores remain the same as they were in 1920. Having recently received generous gifts from Jean Myers and Butch O'Neill, the Board decided to seize this remarkable opportunity to preserve camp's surroundings. The Board has contracted to purchase this asset and each one of us will be asked this fall to make a special gift to help pay for this land. Since the decision to make this purchase, we have already received a lead gift from Muriel Ruhle to construct a JMG training outpost on Skookamee in memory of Tom Ruhle. We want to raise \$250,000 for this land purchase. Our goal is to raise this money by the 85th reunion starting August 11, 2005. The Board will initiate these kinds of efforts when extraordinary circumstances call for extraordinary efforts.

Legacy Giving

We have been handed one of the great places and traditions of our times. Since we have become a charitable non-profit foundation, we have been able to accept tax deductible gifts. Among the most valuable gifts we receive are those directed to us as part of careful and thoughtful estate planning. These gifts have allowed Kawanhee to remain relatively debt free. We also have been creating endowments which among other things have created scholarships and provided for our future financial security. Last year alone, Kawanhee provided \$60,000 in scholarships for deserving boys. We are fortunate that friends of Kawanhee including our President, Mark Standen, have dedicated their professional lives to this planning. We hope that all friends of Kawanhee will help to continue the traditions of Camp Kawanhee. We invite every one to the 85th reunion, we seek your financial support and "May there always be Kawanhee."
