## Greys Continue To Work — Lead By 454 Points

The Maroons came back this week in Sailing and Shop, but on the Athletic field and in the Boating department the Greys were working hard and as a result the Grey team enhanced their lead of a week ago and is now leading in the camp competition by 454 points.

The bulk of the Grey lead, however, came from second and third levels, so that a Maroon comeback in the weeks

ahead is not unlikely.

In Nature, Camperaft, Wrestling and Swimming the two team totals were almost even, but with seventeen levels in Athletics for 445 points and twenty-two levels in Boating for 445 points, the Greys reached a total of 2240 points

for three weeks of activity.

The Maroons total of 1786 came primarily from an even distribution of effort in all departments, but they did manage 210 points in Sailing and 275 points in Shop.

Since these totals were announced at Saturday night's campfire, they do not include the results of the track meet which was not completed until Sunday afternoon. For those pundits who like to keep completely up-to-date, the unofficial difference, including the track meet, is 411 points.

#### Wrestling Opens In Kolloseum

Their Gray opposition was Brandon "Monkey the Masher" Alford, "Murder" Mike Meserole, and "Handy" Andy Doyle.

Only a fair crowd turned out at 8:00 and the promoters began to feel a little discouraged, for there was a lack of the familiar undercurrent of tension and excitement so characteristic of wrestling bouts. However, as the first match got underway, the spectators began to awaken, realizing that they were seeing something new, something different from the usual athletic contest.

The first pair, Dave Traphagen and Brandon Alford did not start slowly; from the beginning they battled like it was the last ten seconds of the match and they were behind

by a few points. Dave drove in for a takedown, putting Brandon temporarily in trouble. Brandon quickly countered this with an escape making the score 2 to 1.

From this point on though, Brandon found himself in trouble, because Dave began to work with "great vigor" and skill, the match ending in a comfortable decision for Traphagen. At this point, an important bystander requested that the cheering be kept to a minimum, but the warning

came too late to affect the excited crowd.

The wrestling practices are aimed towards such an evening as this one, providing boys with the skills necessary for such events. The levels have been changed this year to accent working knowledge of the sport, learning as many holds as possible correctly.
