Greys Lead In First Score

It was announced at the Saturday night campfire, that the Greys held a slight lead over the Maroon Team. The score: Greys 706; the Maroons 580.

The Maroons made virtually a clean sweep of the first water meet, but the Greys made up the difference by so many levels in tennis. The Maroons, however, held a slight lead in the Nature Department with a total of 195 points to the Greys 150 points.

The work in most activities is still in the instructional stage, with few levels to be scored as yet. Points will pile up significantly when each department begins to convert the results of instruction into levels. As Del Tracy, the score keeper pointed out, the score is "only a drop in the bucket" in comparison with the level points which will accumulate as the weeks advance. Last year's score was well over 40,000.

Even though the difference was a mere 126 points, it was still a victory for the week and the Grey team was happy. Mike Meserole led his victorious team in the traditional Kawanhee cheer. Mike praised the team but reminded them that this is just the first week of camp and that they must not let down if they expected to maintain their lead.

Nelson Lancione and the Maroon team, however, could applaud their rivals' initial advantage with good grace and brace themselves to wipe out the lead by next week. He led his team in a cheer for the Greys to show their good sportsmanship.

The Maroons rolled over the Greys like a tidal wave in the first water meet of the season, July 11, and, when the final reports were in, the count was found to be: Maroons 95; Greys 51. The Maroons started pouring on the points in the first relay and continued to increase their lead in every event but three. The Greys won the sailing regatta which gave them a much needed 25 points.

The pajama relay provided the most amusement for the spectators. This included four boys from each team. The starting boys, Scott Tracy, a Grey, and Lew LeVeque, a Maroon, had the advantage of putting on dry pajamas. They swam, pajamas and all, to the small dock, gave the soggy garment to the waiting camper who struggled into them and then he swam back to the large dock. This was done four times, each time the soggy pajamas proving a greater problem. The problem being large, soggy P. J.'s and small boys, since the starting boys were somewhat larger in size, even though the same age. Energetic swimmers Mike Standen and Tom Scott swam right out of their pants during their crossing. However, quick thinking Leigh Perkins and Andy Williams solved the problem by tucking the pants into their swimming trunks, thus winning the relay for the Greys.

Nelson Lancione, a Maroon, captured the senior freestyle with very little difficulty, with his teammate, Jim Davis, coming in second. Wally Whitmyre gave the Greys their second win by coming in first in the Junior B freestyle. The Maroons were on top for the next five events until Roy

Miller nosed out Jim Davis to win the Marathon for the Greys.

Achievement Levels

The "Achievement Level" is the common unit for evaluating accomplishment at Kawanhee. The departments have organized their work so that the progress of the camper can be measured by three graduated "levels" in each age group. The elementary *First Level*, valued at 15 points, the intermediate *Second Level*, valued at 35 points, and the advanced *Third Level* scored at 50 points.
