Greys Bounce Back

The Greys leapfrogged over the Maroons to land 700 points in the lead when the third report on the summer's score was announced at the campfire, Saturday, July 24. Del Tracy reported the current totals to be: Greys 4350; Maroons 3650.

The Greys had entered the previous week of activities trailing the Maroons, by 300 points. They used the seven days well, however, to earn 2690 points while their rivals were gaining only 1690. This wiped out the Maroon advantage of the preceding week and gave the Greys the lead. Leigh Perkins and Craig Wolcott of the Greys gave them a boost with 300 and 230 points respectively. Mike Meserole, the captain of the Greys, pointed out to his cheering team that it would be ill advised to allow this week's victory to lull them into any attitude of complacency for point wise, "they ain't seen nothin' yet".

With this reservation in mind, the Greys could still look back with great satisfaction on a week that favored them on almost every front. Their most spectacular victories were in the Athletic Department with 775 points to their opponents 475, and Tennis with 505 points to their opponents 105. Other leads were: Nature 170 to 150; Sailing 225 to 130; Wrestling 345-105; Campcraft 105-60; Shop 295 to 265. The Maroons one big stand was in Archery 155 to 95. They also held a five point lead in Boating, 50-45. Both teams managed to break even in the Swimming Department, 100 to 100.

In spite of their over-all gain, the Greys had, by no means, had everything their own way in the course of the week. The Maroons swamped the Greys in the second water meet of the season, 95 to 30.

Nelson Lancione and the Maroon team gave the Greys an enthusiastic cheer, but did so with the thought in mind that the Greys might find it harder to hold onto their lead than it was to earn it, for next week they felt sure the score would come out "red." Jim Davis and Jim Estabrook are the high point winners for the Maroons to date.

Greys Sink Again in Second Water Meet

The Maroons swamped the Greys in the second water meet of the season, Saturday, July 24. It was a hot, hazy afternoon and both teams welcomed the opportunity to be in the water. The final score was Maroons 95; Greys 30.

Phil Drake, gave the Maroons their first win in the Junior C freestyle by swimming the distance of 100 feet in 24.9 seconds. Blake Paterson of the Greys was a close second. The Maroons captured the Junior A, B and Senior underwater race all the way, adding valuable points to the score. Nelson Lancione, the Maroon captain, and Roy Miller of the Greys had a close race in the one-lap butterfly swim, with Nelson nosing out Miller. The Greys were disqualified in the Junior A Medley race due to an eager swimmer leaving the dock before the previous swimmer had touched home; however, the Maroon "Jet Propelled" Bob Lancione, finished the relay in the record time of 1:35.5

seconds. The Greys snapped back with a double win in the Junior C ping pong race with Brad Coley and Fred Trayser coming in first and second. Wally Whitmyre and Kurt Feick gave both teams a win by tying the Junior B one-lap freestyle. Bob Lancione and George Brenholts gave the Maroons another lead by being first and second in the Junior A, two-lap breaststroke.

The Senior Canoe Bobbing Race gave the fans the most excitement with Tom Borghi and Jim Proctor coming in first and second with Bruce Leiper and John Bacon trailing. John and Bruce had difficulty maintaining their balance and took several graceful spills. The boys had to stand on the stern of the canoe and bob it to shore. We couldn't decide whether it was bigger feet or better balance that gave Borghi and Proctor their win.

The Maroons walked away with the rest of the meet, thus scoring another victory on the waterfront.

Responsibilities of the Camp Directors

The often repeated question "What do the Directors, 'GR' and 'RC' do in their spare (?) time?" can best be

answered by a review of the task involved in running a camp. Not just during the camp season, but the ever-demanding job of getting camp ready to open.

If it is your opinion that "GR" and "RC" work just two months out of the year and let the money "roll in", let us take a typical year with the Frank Brothers and see if this is true.

The task of running a camp starts about November of each year. You must contact prospective campers, show movies of the camp, interview the parents and the camper, write letters concerning the camp, mail booklets describing the camp and its activities, discuss particular problems that each parent is concerned about; then you might sign up the camper. Sometimes they sign the application at the first showing of the movie; some must wait to see if summer school is necessary; others just can't seem to think of camp when there is snow on the ground, so you must call again and again. Sometimes the mother is a little reluctant to let her son go away from home; sometimes the father wants the boy to promise to be an expert in every activity or he can't come. Problems that most of us have never thought about. We say "What boy wouldn't want to come to camp?" We have been here and have grown to love it; however, this new camper must have the camp presented to him in such a manner that he, too, will learn to love camp. This is a very delicate and time consuming task when consulting new campers.

Then there is the task of sending applications to former campers. They take it for granted that they are returning to camp but fail to send in the application. More time, more letters and perhaps a call or two, to make sure that you don't give his space to a new camper.

Now let us assume it is April and camp is nearly filled. The Frank Brothers have been contacting prospective campers for six months now, and camp is nearly filled. However, they must write letters to the prospects that haven't given them a definite "yes" or "no", as the space can be held no longer. Finally, May 1, is here and the camp is closed for the year. Now they can relax. No, not yet! The Franks must come to Maine and prepare the camp for the season; repair the damage done by the snows and winds of the winter, check the boats, the guns, the targets, the bows, the motors, the pumps, the tennis courts, and each department before they can open camp. Now June 20 has arrived and we find the camp in ship-shape condition and "GR" and "RC" heading back to their home towns to pick up the campers.

"GR" meets his boys at Union Station, Columbus, Ohio, June 29, arriving in camp June 30. "RC" meets his boys at Central Station, New York, arriving in camp June 30 also. Now they can relax. They have the boys in camp and the counselors can take over—they can go sit in the sun. No! Not yet.

The responsibilities of the camp are divided between the brothers. "GR" must supervise the Junior Side of camp which includes the Eagle, Falcon, Panther, Pole Cat, Pine Tree, Hawk and Deer Lodges. He must inspect the lodges daily and help with any problems that might arise in these lodges. In addition to those lodges, he is in charge of the following activities to see that they function properly: Aquatics, Sailing and Boating, Skiing, Shop, Range, Archery, Fishing, Achievement Levels and Awards, Dining Hall and Food.

"RC" has the supervision of the Senior side of camp which includes the Birch, Beaver, Moose, Lynx, Wild Cat, Bear, Crow's Nest, and Badger Lodges. In addition to the lodges, he supervises the Athletics, Nature, Campcraft, Scouting, Junior Maine Guides, and Dramatics Departments as

well as the evening programs, the campfires and the Sunday Services.

Both George and Raymond have the combined supervision of the Master Campers, the Junior and Senior Counselors, plus the camp nurse and the infirmary. Each counselor is requested to consult with each Director affecting the discipline and other special problems in the lodges and activities.

Now if you have been following the article closely, this adds up to 15 lodges, 18 departments, 140 campers plus the staff to bring the total personnel to 200. Most of us think it is a task to manage a family of four or five and feel that we have a never-ending job. We do have, but increase that our small family circle to this 200 figure, would we call the job one with "banker's hours?" Who needs such hours!

When do they relax and sit in the sun? They are able to relax around the middle of September, after making reports to "Uncle Sam", ordering new equipment for next year, repairing equipment damaged during the camp season, etc. But there is no sun, just beautiful fall coloring all around. Now they relax and say "Another successful Kawanhee season is over".

Why do "GR" and "RC" put in so many hours? They are both experienced working with young people and they strive to use that experience well in providing a happy and fruitful summer for the boys. It has been a tradition at Kawanhee for the past 45 years to have the boys work toward the achievement of some worthy objective. They do not believe in an aimless summer for healthy boys. The Camp believes "Fun With A Purpose", "Learning to Do by Doing," and "Finish What you Start." With objectives like these, a qualified staff, excellent facilities and two directors with a never-ending desire to help, spells Kawanhee, a good place for a boy to live, work and play.
