Davis and Miller Head 1966 Teams

The perennial Maroon-Grey rivalry started rolling again on Thursday, July 7th, when the camp lined up in front of the Rec Hall to hear the captains announce the campers they had chosen for the summer's battle for points. The Captains had been introduced to the boys earlier in the week, but the boys were eager to learn if they were to be a Maroon or a Grey this season.

The new Captain of the Maroons is Rich Davis, while Roy Miller leads this year's Greys. Both captains are Junior Counselors with Kawanhee experience to their credit.

The only clue presently available to the scoring potential of the new teams might be found in the list of last summer's high-point winners. On this basis, both teams are even — both teams having twenty-six high point winners to their credit. However, accumulating the points earned by these high point winners, the Maroons have a slight lead of 845 points. The Greys captured, Hank Hiser, who topped the whole camp last year with 1125 points. On the other hand, the Maroons landed John Carrick, who ranked fourth with 895 points. The second and third place winners did not return to camp this year.

The points of last year are history now, of course, and each team must start anew. With two dynamic captains as we have this year, the score might be even closer than that of 1965 — if possible. The score was just 15 points difference to the Grey's advantage. Over the years of competition, the Maroons have had the edge, scoring twenty-two victories to twenty for the Greys, and one tie. What team will claim the victory in 1966? That will be the answer both captains will be trying to answer for the next seven weeks.

Greys Win A Water Meet

Roy Miller, the Grey's captain, determined to prove that the Greys could win a water meet, led his team to victory in the first water meet of the season, Saturday, July 11th. Roy remembers, all too well, how the Grey team was rolled over like a tidal wave in every watermeet of last season. The Grey team has one distinct advantage in their favor this season and that is that they can hear their leader, loud and clear, when he is encouraging them to swim faster. A megaphone, he doesn't need.

The Junior C, Ping pong race, proved that Brad Coley and Clint Newbold are the two windiest members of their teams by placing first and second respectively. Paul Doege, of the Greys, won the one-lap backstroke race with Frank Erickson, of the Maroons, making it a close second. The Junior A, one-lap backstroke was the closest race of the meet. Bill Kientz (G) touched the dock a split second before Bob Vockel (M) who tallied for second place. Phil Drake (G) led the one-lap freestyle all the way, tallying fifteen feet or so before second place winner, Stan McCleave (M). Rex Coons (M) led by two lengths over Paul Doege (G) in the two-lap Junior B freestyle. The Senior freestyle relay showed experienced skill in all the swimmers. Steve

Grubbs, on the fourth lap, reached the dock just a few feet before Bob Lancione, to tally first for the Greys. Mike Crane tallied first for the Maroons in the two-lap breaststroke with Tony MacDonald of the Greys close behind for second. Nick Gill of the Greys, and Scott Paterson of the Maroons had a close race for third and fourth respectively. The Junior C freestyle gave Stony Hinds a little difficulty. Stony, almost big enough to see, started the first lap in great style. He made just one mistake. Each time that he needed to take a breath, he not only stopped swimming, he stood on the bottom to take that breath. Naturally, he lost a little ground, and his competitor, Blake Paterson left him a little behind. When a "fella" has to breathe, he has to breathe, says Stony. Raub Smith was still standing on the docks waiting to swim the last lap for his team when Frank Weeks touched the other dock to give the Greys the victory. However, Raub, to fulfill the Kawanhee motto "Always finish what you start", showed excellent form as he swam the last lap of the relay. Jim Estabrook gave the Greys a half-lap lead, which they held all the way, to win the Jr. B. freestyle relay. The Junior A Medley Relay was an easy win for the Greys as Tony MacDonald gave Mike Wolfe a two-thirds lap lead as he swam the last lap of the relay. The Senior Medley Relay furnished the excitement of the meet. It was a close race all the way. Scott Tracy (G) tallied a couple of feet before Andy Williams in the backstroke; Rich Davis (M) and Randy Schwartz (G) were neck-and-neck in the breaststroke; Steve Grubbs (G) and Bob Lancione (M) were very close together, with Steve touching a split second before Bob; this left the decision up to Roy Miller (G) and Tim McKee (M) to finish in the freestyle, with Roy, the Grey's captain finishing first. The final score was Greys 76; Maroons 58, in one of the smoothest watermeets Kawanhee has seen.

Well-Seasoned Counselors On Senior Staff

Kawanhee initiated its forty-sixth season Thursday, June 30th, in the Webb Lake Valley which was sporting a well-groomed camp for the enjoyment of some one hundred-forty campers and fifty-seven, well-chosen staff members. The camp which Mr. George and Raymond Frank had assembled at the end of their winter of planning and preparation, proved to be nudging at the seams of capacity.

Most ponderable component of this staff is the group of twenty-four Senior Counselors returning to Kawanhee from past seasons; ranging from 34 years to 5 years service to the camp. The fact that their vast reserves of experience and loyalty are once more available, assures a success for the 1966's eight weeks.

A camp with forty-five successful seasons to its credit must have a firm foundation. This foundation was formed with the idea that camp is to have a purpose and the boys are to learn while they have fun. This concept of a good camp was started by "Ma" Frank in the 1920's, when the camp was starting its first season. This same purpose is being carried on by her sons, George and Raymond, as they begin the forty-sixth season of Camp Kawanhee.

George and Raymond have a never-ending desire to help young people. George was principal of McGuffey School in Columbus, Ohio, before his retirement. A position that he served so successfully that he is still remembered affectionately by all. Raymond was Director of Youth Activities at the First Presbyterian Church, Englewood, New Jersey, before his retirement. A position in which he was able to help many young people find the right road. With the vast experience that they have accumulated with young people, the objectives they have in mind, the qualified staff which they provide, the never-ceasing energy which they, themselves, provide, and the excellent facilities that they provide, one need not wonder why Kawanhee is a good place for a boy to live, work and play.
