Maroons Take The First Lead

The Maroons, a little disappointed over their defeat in the first watermeet of the season, proved that even though they were a little slower than the Greys in swimming, they were a little more ambitious in earning level points, by taking the lead in the first score of the season.

Both captains know all too well that this weeks score—603 to 560—is minute compared to the fifty or sixty thousand points that will be accumulated during the eight-week camp season. However, the 43 point lead put the Maroons on top and the vigor of the cheer which rocked the pines on Council Point bore witness to the fact that Rich Davis, the Maroon captain, was pleased with his boys.

Roy Miller and his Greys acknowledged their defeat in all good graces, but with the determination that things would be somewhat different at the next reading of the score.

The Greys Do It Again

The Greys and their fearless leader, Roy Miller, finding the taste of victory to their liking, leap-frogged over the Maroons to win their second watermeet of the season. It was like the game of "leapfrog" all the way throughout the meet, with each team taking every other event.

Charles Somerville gave the Maroons their first score by placing first in the Junior C kickboard race, with Fred Abels tallying second for the Greys. Stony Hinds, (M), remembering not to stop and touch the bottom, kicked in for third place. Paul Doege, (G), showed the skill of the smaller boys by placing first in the Junior B backstroke, thus tying the score at this point. Mike Crane, (M), decided to break the tie and placed first in the Junior A, two-lap breaststroke. Roy Miller, the Grey captain, and Bob Lancione, (M), had the first two laps of an eight-lap relay for the Seniors, with Roy tallying a few feet before Bob, to give Scott Tracy, (G), a small lead over Steve Fink, (M). Scott added to the lead and gave Randy Schwartz, (G), a comfortable lead over Tim McKee, (M). Schwartz maintained the lead, giving Steve Grubbs, (G), a head start in the last two laps over Jim Davis, (M). Steve tallied first, giving the Greys the win to tie once again. Energetic Brad Coley, (M), and his perpetual motor, tried very hard to break the tie, but just couldn't make up the half-lap advantage Seth Kallman, (G), had given Phil Drake, (G). Phil tallied first and gave the Greys the lead by taking first in the Junior C freestyle relay.

The Junior B freestyle relay was the closest race of the meet. Frank Erickson, (M), and Carlos Capacete, (G), lead off and were neck-and-neck all the way; however, Carlos touched the dock a split-second before Frank, giving Scott Leiper, (M), and Mark Sengelmann, (G), another close lap, with a tie decision at the dock. Mike Hall, (M), and Luis Benitez, (G), had an even start in the third lap of the relay, with Mike reaching his man, Rex Coons, (M), first. Rex matched skills with Jim Estabrook, (G), to finish the relay. Jim gave his all to make up the difference, but just couldn't reach the finish before Rex. The victory for the Maroons tied the score once again.

The Junior A Medley relay started off in a dead-heat with Bill Kientz, (G), and Bob Vockel, (M), showing excellent form in the backstroke. Mike Crane, (M), took the lead over Andy Somerville, (G), in the breaststroke, giving Jon White, (M), a definite advantage over Tony MacDonald, (G), in the butterfly. However, Tony, determined to make up the difference, reached the finish first to tag his man, Mike Wolfe, (G), who tallied first over Scott Paterson, (M), to break the tie in the Grey's favor.

The five-man relay was a first at Kawanhee and was a very exciting climax to a smooth-running watermeet. Both captains, Davis and Miller, knew this would be the deciding point of the meet, and both were determined to make it in their favor. Clinton Newbold, (G), and Doug Allan, (M), started the relay by racing from the Rec Hall to the big dock to tag Hank Hiser, (G), and Rex Coons, (M), who had to swim to the small dock. Hank lost a little ground trying to keep his hair out of his eyes, thus giving Rex the lead. Bill Proctor, (G), and Mike Standen, (M), had to paddle a canoe to their captains, who were waiting at Pine Point. Mike had a definite advantage over Bill, as he was able to leave the dock first; however, Bill made up the difference and they both reached the Point at the same time. The team captains had to portage the canoes to the Inn Beach where another paddler was waiting. Miller, muscles bulging, picked up the canoe and started out with it as if it were a toy. Rich, muscles also bulging, picked up his canoe with little difficulty, but he was facing the wrong direction and had to turn around, which lost him a little time. However, he made up the loss in the woods as Roy, hair and canoe both in his way, didn't see a tree that had been there for some fifty years or so. The tree didn't budge, so Roy and the canoe had a little difficulty. However, quick-thinking Roy, regained his composure and reached the Inn Beach just as Rich did. Both captains gave his teammate an even start for the finish, but Jim Proctor (G), paddled around the Point and to the finish some sixty-feet before Steve Fink (M). Steve had swum a two-lap relay in the meet and had lost a little of his "go-go-go" power. The final score was Greys 57; Maroons 49.

Achievement Levels

The "Achievement Level" is the common unit for evaluating accomplishment at Kawanhee. The departments have organized their work so that the progress of the camper can be measured by three graduated "levels" in each age group. The elementary **FIRST LEVEL**, valued at 15 points, the intermediate **SECOND LEVEL**, valued at 35 points, and the advanced **THIRD LEVEL**, scored at 50 points. Kawanhee's "Roar Wildcat Roar" concluded the singing for the evening—we thought. The achievements and levels were read and it was time to call on Del Tracy for the score. Feeling a little musical himself this night, he taught the campers a new song, "The Muffin Song" to the tune of "Sugar In The Morning", before he read the score. This song rated a "Hoch Class 'A' Applause" from the campers. After the traditional Kawanhee cheer from both teams, the campers returned to their lodges for the night.

Sunday Service, July 17th

Thanks to the warm, sunny weather of Sunday, July 17th, the first morning service of the season was held in the Chapel on the shore, with the great altar of blue skies, distant mountains and sparkling water behind the birch cross. Del Tracy conducted the worship service using the "Sermon on the Mount" as his scripture and "Responsibility" as his topic.

Responsibility to one's self by using what God gave us, not complaining about what he did not give us, and responsibility to one's God by thanking Him for giving his Son to save us and not complaining to Him because we are sometimes different than our fellow man. He stressed the desire to do away with the word "handicapped" as he likes to think that no one is handicapped in a true sense.

"We may be without an arm, a leg, sight, hearing, a diabetic, a palsied person, but to me he is not handicapped. He has a condition that must be overcome, and he must give due respect to his God who gave him this inconvenience, by using the advantages that God did give him. We are all different because God wanted us to be different. Some of us are rich, some poor, some white, some dark, some can jump 6 feet in the high jump, some can hit a home run every time at bat, some can sail a boat, some can play the piano, but does it make us handicapped if we all cannot do these things? We can do some things that they might not be able to do. We are only handicapped if we do not use to good advantage what God did give us." Del concluded his talk by telling the campers to never think that they are not loved, but to be loved, they, themselves, must be loving.

The whole camp gathered in the Rec. Hall Sunday evening for Vespers. A movie about our American waterways concluded the evening. The sound of taps echoing through the camp called an end to a very full week of activities at Kawanhee. The campers were ready for a good night's rest, as tomorrow would start a new week of projects.
