Greys All The Way

It was a "Grey" week all the way at Kawanhee this sixth week of the 1967 season, not weather wise but score wise. The Watson-Whitmyre Greys, a little annoyed at the Maroon's bite into their lead of the previous week, fired all rockets and soared out in front by 1347 points.

The Greys had watched their lead dwindle to a mere 244 points the previous week, which made it a very uncomfortable advantage. The Presidential Mountain Hike

With great anticipation, twenty three Kawanhees left camp on August 10th. for our biannual hike on the Presidential range of the White Mountains. Under the guidance of Clarence Bateman, we arrived at Pinkham Notch at 11:20. Frank Stewart, our trip leader, gave each lad a bagged lunch, plus oranges and candy bars. Frank then gave instructions to each hiker to stay in line and to be sure your pack is well adjusted to your back. After a short visit to the Appalachian Mountain Club hut at Pinkham Notch, we lined up for the first stage of our hike. Our first stop was at Cascade Falls, where we removed our packs and ate our delicious peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, plus our oranges, cookies and candy bars. Always at lunch we have a lot of trading of sandwiches for cookies and oranges. Many of us took pictures of this beautiful falls and then we "upped packs" and up the trail we went.

After a few short stops we reached Hermit Lake Shelter. Here we came upon the awe inspiring view of Tuckerman Ravine, Boot Spur and Lions Head, all ahead of us. Our Leader, Frank Stewart, placed us at least fifteen feet apart for the climb through the ravine. We gingerly picked our way up through this seventy-foot ravine. The signs, the first aid stations and the red crosses on the rocks made us realize that we had to keep safety as our keynote. We could now see Washington's peak in front of us, challenging us to not give up. At about 3:30 we reached Bigelow Lawn and then we knew that our destination for the night, Lakes in the Clouds Shelter, was at hand. We were met by fierce winds, clouds and cold as we travelled over the lawn of huge boulders. We had to watch the rock cairns that would lead us to the Hut. This was done by 4:30. We were a happy contingent, knowing that we had almost finished our first days journey in the Presidentials.

After "checking in" each of us picked our beds for the night and soon we could smell the aroma of a delicious dinner. We feasted on soup, broiled chicken, potatoes, fresh corn, tossed salad, hot drinks and a delicious dessert. After supper we all helped dry the dishes and pack lunches, then to work off a wee bit of our dinner, we hiked up Mount Monroe (5,385) which was shrouded in clouds. The boys literally ran up this very easy ascent and when we reached the summit, we all shouted our success. One reason why this climb was so easy was that we were accompanied by several young ladies who were climbing the mountain. We were glad to be received into the warmth of our hut when we descended Monroe. We were just a wee bit wet from the clouds. The lads spent the night playing assorted card games, and reading the registration books at the hut. At 11:00 we were all in bed and the light went out. In a very few minutes all one could hear was the gentle breathing of many tired hikers.

At 6:30 Friday morning we were aroused by the ringing of a gong. After a hasty wash in ice cold water, we were given a breakfast of fruit juice, hot cereal, hot rolls, fried eggs, sausage, and beverage. We knew that we could conquer any mountain after such a good breakfast. In the morning we could see that our hut was enclosed with fog, and clouds. We all helped in folding the blankets, sweeping the floors, wiping the dishes and preparing the lunches. By the time we finished these joyful tasks, the clouds started to

move and the sun broke through over the peak of Mt. Washington. We all rushed out of the hut to see a rare phenomenon of nature, a cloud rainbow with the peaks of Clay and Jefferson breaking through the clouds. You who have travelled by air know the glory of riding through the clouds, but we had the glory of walking in and on the clouds.

We left Lakes in the Clouds at 8:00 a.m., very sorrowful as we had made many friends, but we had paths to hike and peaks to conquer. After a very difficult climb, we reached the summit of Mt. Washington with the sun shining brightly on us, but we couldn't see much beyond where we were standing. We stayed on Washington for an hour watching the cog railroad ascend the mountain. The folk that travelled up the mountain by railroad and car could hardly believe that we had climbed up this difficult mountain. Soon after 9:00 Frank gave the call for us to get our packs on our backs and hit the trail. We spent the morning climbing Mt. Clay (5532) and then Mt. Jefferson (5715). Frank led the boys in a climb up a fairly difficult face of Jefferson and were we surprised when we found that a coed camp were finishing their lunch as we arrived. We chatted a bit and then we had the pleasure of seeing about twenty other girls and their leaders come over the crest of the mountain. After a short visit we were off to climb Mt. Adams. It was a long and difficult climb but we made the heights of Adams (5798) by 3:00.

We climbed down one of the more difficult faces of Mt. Adams and again we were met by clouds. We hurried to get to our evening's destination before the clouds became too thick. By the time we reached Madison Springs Hut, we could just about see ten feet in front of us. We were glad to be in the security of our lodge and to again have the aroma of good food meet our olfactory nerves.

We helped to set the tables for dinner which was served at 6:00. We had apple juice, corned beef, baked potatoes, string beans, hot bread, tossed salad, hot beverage and a delicious bread pudding. We were glad to assist in clearing the tables and wiping the dishes plus putting up the lunches for our trip down the mountain. The evening was spent playing games, reading, and getting acquainted with our hut mates.

A wee bit after 9:00 the hut boys, who are all college students, served us hot drinks and announced that the lights would be off at 9:50, so off to bed we went.

Saturday morning we were again awakened at 6:30 to a clear, cold world. The moisture on the windows had frozen overnight and we were glad that on this 12th. day of August that we had a warm hut to protect us. After a very hearty breakfast, we climbed Mt. Madison (5363) without our packs. We spent several minutes up on the summit of Madison taking pictures and enjoying the wonderful view afforded by this beautiful peak. Regretfully we started our descent from Madison, our last peak to conquer. Soon we were hiking along the Knives Edge of the Air Line trail. After a consultation with other leaders, Frank Stewart led us down the Chemin des Dames trail. This was an adventuresome trail and it challenged all of us to keep the rules of good mountain climbing. We had to keep twenty feet apart. We had to be sure not to allow any loose rocks to slide down the mountains. We had to take our time and think of the other fellow. On this trail we discovered many caves of rocks and the lads had an enjoyable time exploring them. Then down we climbed through the Valley Way to just above Tama Falls where we stopped and had our lunch. While eating our lunch, a hut boy came through carrying his heavy load of food up the mountain. We were surprised by the fact that he carried most of the weight of his load over his head.

This was a good lesson for us to learn for future hiking and pack carrying.

On down we went following the Valley Way Trail. We met many hikers on their way up to Madison. We reached our destination, Ravine House at Randolph, just a wee bit before 1:30, tired but happy. After a few minutes rest, the boys were up playing games on the lawn. Almost on the dot of 2:30 Bates arrived and we loaded the camp truck and Bates' car for the ride back to camp. We arrived at camp in time to clean up for supper, thus ending a very happy hike and mountain climb.
