KAWANHEE LAUNCHES INTO THE 80'S

The first week of Kawanhee's 60th Season saw a rejuvenated camp in full swing. Camp was blessed with a week of beautiful, clear, hot weather which ended in a strong two-day blow.

Thanks to the concentrated efforts of Andrew Detrick, Mike Altmaier, Ferd Schoedinger, Chris Stallman, Chris Yardley, Big John Detrick and Jane Estabrook, Kawanhee is sporting some new looks. Eight out of twelve cabins have been repainted a rustic red with grey trim. New stairs, screens, shutters and windows have straightened out many lodges. Further camp construction saw the eagerly awaited diving platform rebuilt at the end of the big dock. The boys will now have a platform with a low and high board from which to jump or dive. TREASURY AND TRASH


