Deers Drop Anchor Up-Lake for a Kawanhee First

At 1:00 p.m., Friday, July 20th, Rich Darmanin and Tom Taylor led eight of the Deer Lodgers on an interesting and very different kind of campout. Throughout the week, the Lodge had been planning an overnight, but due to various conflicts and problems, there was difficulty in finding a suitable place for the campout. Then, the Wednesday before, the senior members of the Sailing Department decided to take things in their own hands and organize an overnight for the Lodge on the sailboats. Thus it was that Mr. Darmanin with Allen Cutler in the Beetle Boat; Mr. Taylor with Miguel Nunez, Carlos Margarida, Peter Seeley, David Lamb, and Bryan Day in the Gemini; and Whitaker Wright and Rick Stockhausen in a tech dingy all set sail for parts unknown at the Head of Lake Webb.

The sail up did not begin auspiciously: it started to rain. However, the breeze was enough to keep things moving, and Rich and Allen in the Beetle Boat ran a "pit stop" into Weld for much needed breakfast supplies. By 5:00, we had dropped anchor at the head of the Lake and began setting up our overnight canopy and tarps. It was just in season also for a driving rainstorm suddenly caught us. Although we got a little wet, the excitement of the moment caught everyone. Finally, the canopies were lashed down, and bedrolls (not quite dry) were rolled out, and we en-

joyed a supper of peanut butter sandwiches. The excitement of sleeping out on board ship had drained everyone considerably, and we fell asleep early, listening to the pitter-patter of the pelting drops off and on through the night.

On the next morning, we arose with the sun although it was hidden behind a deep bank of fog. The rain had stopped, but it was still overcast and calm. We dismantled our protective shelters and had breakfast. At 8:00, the sails were hoisted, bedrolls and equipment put away, the anchor was hoisted, and the courageous crew began its journey down the five miles separating the Head of the Lake from Camp Kawanhee. We were plagued by very slight and shifting winds, but the fog began to burn off, and it became a great day for basking while we slowly drifted along. With a little help from the paddles, the group finally warped into Kawanhee Cove at 12:00 noon, making our complete voyage and stay on the vessels one of 23 hours duration, quite possibly one of the longest "sails" ever undertaken or completed by a Lodge at Kawanhee.

Although rain and light air added little to the comfort of the trip, the boys enjoyed it thoroughly and are anxiously contemplating the possibility of another such trip before the Season is over. Perhaps next time we will anchor in other coves and do some snorkling at Bowley Rock.

Family Swamps Scotland

The Scotland winning streak started by the introduction of a new name for that team was cut short last week in a devastating manner by Frank Finetto's Family, as the Scots went down 17-3. It was yet another display of Family offensive power, and defensive bumbling by all.

Kent Wallingford's double, the Scot's third and last hit of the day, was the major strike of the inning. The game was cut short of the

Tennis Department Goes Back to Basics

Forehand; 8/10, hit from instructor at baseline, to be hit into opposite singles court
backhand, same as forehand
serves; 8/10 to both courts
volleys; 8/10, four forehand, four backhand, hit from instructor at baseline, to be hit into opposite singles court
lobs; 5/10 with proper form
play one set with instructor, camper keeping score
Pass a written test on rules, etc.

Fourth Level: 100 points

forehand; 12/15, hit from instructor at baseline, to be hit:
3 baseline cross-court
3 shallow cross-court
3 baseline down-the-line
3 shallow down-the-line
backhand; 10/15, hit from instructor at baseline to be hit;
5 cross-court
5 down-the-line
serves; 12/15 hard serves, 6 to each court
volleys; 8/10, hit from instructor at baseline, to be hit into a defined area
lobs; 8/10, hit from instructor at baseline, to be effective,
5 forehand, 3 backhand
overheads; 6/10, hit from instructor at baseline, to be hit into opposite singles court near service line
Demonstrate chop, half-volley, etc.
Play in Camp tournament
Pass the now familiar test on rules, etc.

The department is hoping this is only the first of many athletic fundays; the Kineo lasses will be coming to Kawanee for a combined archery-tennis day next week. The Cape Cod Knockabouts: A Perspective View

Soon after World War I, Captain Charles Gurney of the Cape Cod Shipbuilding Company designed and began construction of an inexpensive sailboat suitable both for racing and for family use in the waters of Buzzards Bay and Nantucket Sound where rip tides, steep chop, sandbars, rocks and shallow bays are the rule rather than the exception. The result was the Cape Cod Knockabout. From 1918 to 1948, over 3,000 such boats were built by Cape Cod Shipbuilding, the greatest number of one-design boats that had ever been built by a single firm up to that time. Hundreds of East Coast sailors learned to sail on these boats, and many of the sturdy craft are still sailing. At Kawanhee, our Yacht Club has two such boats, the *Sea Gull* and *Sea Hawk*, and Commodore Taylor has two vintage "baby" Knockabouts (as the old wooden version is now called). The *Sea Gull* came to Kawanhee in about 1930. She was much different then than she is now, but she is still essentially the same boat. In the early days, the Knockabouts sported sails with vertical mitre lines, a small-footed jib with jib boom, a longer main boom, smaller centerboard, centerboard trunk, and rudder, higher coaming, and the mainsail rode up the mast on metal rings. Despite these more primitive fittings, as Winthrop Munro says (*Boating Magazine*, July, 1961), "The Cape Cod Knockabouts could out-sail and out-maneuver most of the dories and catboats of the day and many of the larger racing craft. They could fight their way through narrow channels against racing tides, sail in ten inches of water, buck choppy seas, and, when well-reefed, could take almost any weather that came their way." However, the design did not become stagnant but kept changing. In 1937, the design was altered and the rig was modernized. These changes can be seen in the *Sea Hawk* which

Kawanhee purchased in 1946. The cockpit was squared off and splash boards were installed. Spreaders were removed and the boom became a "t-boom."

The mainsail was slightly decreased in size as the boom was shortened, but the jib sail was made longer on the foot, without a jib boom, to give the boat better balance and to decrease the heavy weather helm which the early boats demonstrated. The centerboard and rudder were increased in size, and the older traveller-deck horse mainsheet system was replaced by the present "runner" system.

At Kawanhee, the introduction of the newer *Sea Hawk* created a desire to "modernize" the *Sea Gull* so that both boats would be able to compete on a near parity. Thus the *Sea Gull* was changed in the ways that we have seen.

The Kawanhee Knockabouts, and their privately-owned sisters, the *Dolphin* and *Swiftsure* which are presently undergoing extensive restoration under the Shop, are representative of the extremely fine craftsmanship of the early twentieth century New England boatbuilders. The fact that the *Sea Gull* is still sailing after over forty years of hard service at the Camp is proof of the enduring qualities of these boats. And through these years, both the *Gull* and the *Hawk* have given many Kawanhee campers exciting rides and taught them the beauty of movement under sail.

Martian Landing — 1967
