### Kawanhees Joyfully Conquer the Presidentials

Eleven Kawanhees journeyed from camp August 16th to spend the weekend living on top of the Presidentials. The Bouncing Buggy delivered us to Pinkham Notch (headquarters for the Appalachian Mountain Club), where we checked the weather and hiking conditions. We weighed our packs and found that Chuck Hoffhine's was the heaviest—10 and behold, someone had added a 25 lb. rock to it! Sam Detrick's was the lightest, weighing under 5 lbs.

We left AMC headquarters and took the fire road to Cascade Falls and then on to Tuckerman Ravine shelter, where we had our traditional peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, oranges, and candy bars. Our lone lady hiker, Amy Jordan, took off her shoes and socks and cooled her feet in the mountain stream. We took off for the Head Wall, following the new Tuckerman Ravine Trail.

The going was difficult and slow; Quebec hiker Francois Morissette urged us to "go, go," but we timed our pace to the slowest hiker (the leader). After two hours we had conquered the Head Wall and headed for Lake in the Clouds hut. We arrived hot, tired, and hungry, but happy that the most difficult climb was over.

We enjoyed a roast beef dinner in the hut, and then climbed Mt. Monroe, 5,385 feet high. It was a lovely place to watch the sun set. By 9:30 lights were out and all fell asleep.

Sunday morning, we were awakened by a cheery greeting from a hut girl, and soon had a big breakfast. One lad reportedly ate 20 pancakes. Leaving the hut, we followed the trail to Mt. Washington, 6,288 feet, where we stayed almost two hours visiting the weather observatory and the museum. The boys enjoyed

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The "winds of change" had been blowing all week at Kawanhee. They brought whitecaps breaking on the shores, chilly nights requiring extra blankets, and wool shirts at breakfast. But by Saturday, the sun shone in a clear blue sky, with the majestic mountains and softly rippling lake for a backdrop, campers and visitors gathered on the shore for the final awards ceremony.

The "winds of change" blew again as sleepless statistician B.A. Altmaier revealed the final camp score. With another last-minute reversal, '74 history was repeated, but this year the Maroons, who had been behind all summer, emerged the winners. Their final total was 37,511; the Grey team was close with 37,276 points.

In a way, the Maroon win was a victory for the Shamamian brothers, who may well go down in Kawanhee history with other pairs such as the Franks, Birches, Altmaiers, and Standens, to list just a few. Henry, new Junior Maine Guide, was also the summer's high point winner, with a total of 1520. Oscar, Maroon team captain, was justifiably proud of brother Henry, one of "all the Maroons in the world" who all worked hard for those extra points.

Steve Yale and his Grey team should also be proud, for the score was close, and they had turned in fine performances all summer.

Special awards were presented for greatest swimming improvement, to Dick Kirikian; for greatest athletic improvement to Paul Davis; and for greatest physical improvement, to Sam Detrick.

It seemed such a short time from the week of "firsts" to the week of "lasts". Campers hurried to finish one last project, score one last point, earn one last level, and take one last swim. All too soon, Chief Kawanhee said goodbye and the sachems buried their messages. We took our last looks at the lake and mountains,

As the rain clouds hovered near, we raised full tarps over the boats to protect us. Several of the boats developed very substantial living quarters which were quite comfortable in great contrast to previous years' "aboard-ship" overnights when as many as six

persons might be crammed aboard one sloop. This year seemed like luxury. We even had a cask of fresh milk aboard! The evening seemed a long one as we waited for a special surprise for supper. However, it was (or seemed) awfully late, so we whiled away the time by reading comic books, snoozing, singing, swimming, or listening to a small radio which somehow had stowed away contrary to the original sailing instructions. Finally, it grew dark, and we settled down a bit and waited. Suddenly, the red and green bow light of the swift G.R. was seen streaming on the water. 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## Once More Up

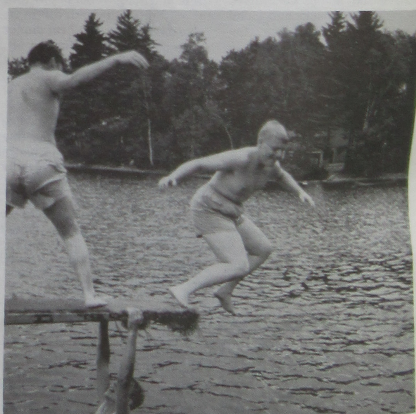
Mark Schiewetz led all scorers with 24 points for his team. Zeke backed him up with 12 points and Mark Standen collected 4. Fritz

## Regattas Summer Series Sealed For 1975

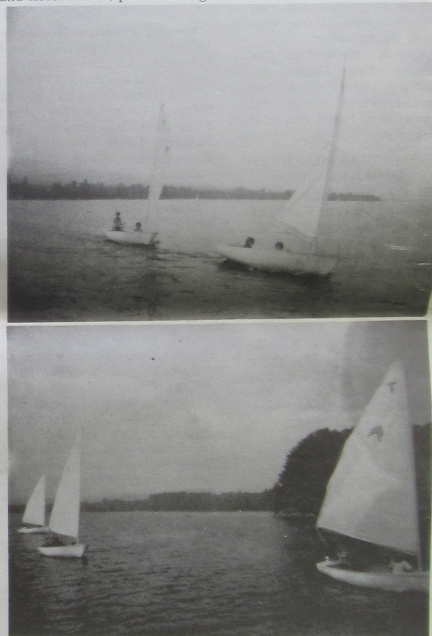

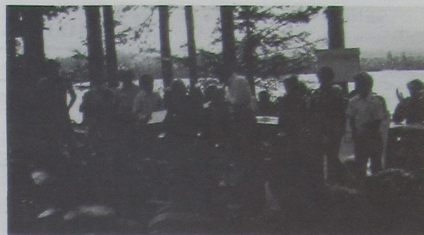
#### Tie All-Stars
