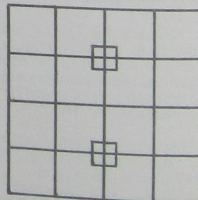

### SWIMMING

This year the Swimming Department is offering a short course in Basic Water Safety which entails learning how to make elementary assists, (such as reaching assists), and assists using equipment, (such as a reach pole). The boys are taught that they must never swim after a victim until they have had proper training in Advanced Lifesaving, but that there are other ways to make a rescue. In addition, they are taught mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, and self-rescue in a swamped or capsized boat. There are no age or swimming prerequisites for the course, as it deals only with non-swimming rescues and self-rescue.
