The Maroons Did It Again

Once the Maroons were in high gear there was no stopping them and so they marched onward and upward earning levels which added valuable points to their slight lead of the previous week. The satisfying taste of victory gave Bill Proctor and his Maroons an incentive to remain No. 1 in the race for points; therefore, they applied the "Three D's" to their daily schedule: DRIVE, DETERMINATION AND DESIRE.

Tim Williams and his Greys dragged their feet somewhat during the week but they were able to keep their heads above the water in a few departments. They were, nevertheless, outscored by 355 points for the week by the Maroons. This, added to their lead of 266 points from the previous week, plus the points earned for winning the watermeet Saturday, put the Maroons out in front by 758 points for the season.

Both captains informed their boys that the levels were there to be earned and if they were desirous to be No. 1 when the season ends, they must get in there and do their best to earn points as they learn valuable skills.

The grey skies released some raindrops Saturday but the Maroons didn't care as they upset the Greys in the second watermeet of the season, 161-124. Director of Activities, Del Tracy, announced at the noon meal that the meet would go on, rain or shine, and with the threat of lightning nonexistent, the team members lined the beaches with wet heads

but high spirits.

In the Junior C dog paddle-free style relay, Jeff Luce "barked" his way to victory in the dog paddle and Tim Bolon sped in the free style to win it for the Maroons. Scott Daugherty and John Detrick went the two laps for the Greys. Tim Bolon and Mike Darmanin stretched every muscle fiber in the rowboat race. Mike was so small he had to sit on the life cushion to get the proper balance to row. They were neck-n-neck going to the turning buoy. The requirements of the event called for them to jump out of their boats, climb back into the boat and race to the finish line. Mike Darmanin, by virtue of his quick in-and-out, crossed the line just ahead of Tim Bolon.

Roger Sweet and Raub Smith won the broom-paddle canoe race as John Ireland and Pete Freimanis had trouble mastering the J-stroke with their brooms and cut a wide corner to slow down their progress. However, I must say, they paddle better with a broom than they sweep with a broom.
