Washington was ZERO at this time. We rejoiced at getting over the Headwall and soon headed for the Lakes in the Cloud Hut where we found a happy welcome. We soon chose our bunks for the night and had a cup of hot chocolate to warm our chilled bones. After a very delicious dinner, we all climbed Mt. Monroe (5,380') and enjoyed one of the most beautiful sunsets that God has given us this summer. The evening was spent playing

games, talking to the other guests (female) and star gazing. You could almost reach out and grasp Venus and Jupiter. At 10:00 P.M. the lights were put out and we all went to bed, tired but happy for having climbed Mt. Monroe.

Morning comes early at the huts. The "hut boys" had us up and out of bed soon after 6:30 A.M. and breakfast was served by 7:30. Again we helped wash the dishes and clean up the hut. After picking up our lunches, we headed for Mt. Washington (6,288'), the highest mountain in the North East. It took us about an hour to reach the summit. We spent an hour visiting the weather observatory, the gift shop, watching the Cog Railroad and writing cards. We felt a wee bit superior as we watched the weak humans get off the Cog Railroad and the cars and buses. They waved to us as we headed off the summit to climb Mt. Clay (5,532'). All day we had a great view of Great Gulf. After Washington, Clay was not too hard. We saw the marker where a young man had lost his life taking photographs and while climbing up the Headwall, we passed the marker for a Ph.D who lost his life in an avalanche. These markers helped us to be very cautious. From the summit of Clay we could see Jefferson challenging us to conquer its rugged rocks. Part way up Mt. Jefferson (5,715') we stopped in a beautiful grassy spot between several huge rocks to eat our lunch. We had great fun exchanging candy bars and cookies for sandwiches and oranges. My how good that Pepsi tasted that I had hauled up the mountain! Then on we went to the top of Jefferson. Our next long stop was at Peabody Spring, where a metal emergency quonset hut is located. On Wednesday, during a terrible thunder and lightning storm, 30 people were crowded into this hut for safety. It may have saved their lives. We took time to clean the hut and burn the debris. We also took time to get a cooling drink of delicious mountain-spring water and then onward to our last mountain of the day — Mt. Adams (5,798'). On the way we climbed Mt. Sam Adams (5,520') and on the way down we almost climbed Mt. J. Q. Adams, but we were "done in". So we scrambled over rocks following the trail to Madison Huts; at about 4:45 we arrived at the hut tired, but good and happy that we had made it. The dinner at Madison Hut was "out of this world". I don't see how they serve such good food when you realize everything must be carried up from Randolph on the backs of the "Hut Boys". We again spent an evening of card games, writing, and just taking it easy.

Bright and early Saturday morning we were awakened by the sound of the "Hut" gong. Then a real hearty breakfast, after which we helped with the dishes and we cleaned the Hut. At 8:30 A.M. we climbed our last mountain and our easiest. Madison is only 5,363' at the summit. While on the top of Madison, one of the A.M.C. Guides came up and gave us a very informative and interesting lecture on the surrounding mountains. We spent over an hour just relaxing and enjoying the view on Madison.

Returning to the Hut, we gathered up our packs and headed for Bates and his "Bouncing Buggy". On the way back to camp, Bates treated us to custard, milk shakes and other "goodies". We arrived at Kawanhee, happy and tired.

It was amazing what great physical condition our boys were in. We had little or no physical trouble with the lads. A few blisters and a scratch or two, but that was all. When you realize that we went from 30° to 90° temperatures and winds blowing a gale, it is good to know the lads could take it. I highly commend every hiker for his stamina and his willingness to cooperate all the way. Especially, I would like to commend Craig Miller and John McDonald for their keen interest in ecology. They filled their packs with litter left by careless hikers. Hollis Macomber, who will not be 11 until August 21, did a great job hiking and our smallest

hiker, Thorp Minister kept right up with us and always came up with a smile. The lads that took this trip were: Frank Finetto, John Ireland, Thorp Minister, John McDonald, Craig Miller, Tim Harrison, Herman Tice and Hollis Macomber. Next year we tackle Mt. Katahdin.
