Ticemen May Turn

During a week which witnessed an inaugural wrestling match on new mats, a colorful and unprecedented counselor's softball victory over the Rumford Bucks, and frenzied preparation among Master Campers for the Junior Maine Guide tests, few people noticed that competition between the Maroons and the Greys had reached the half-way point, and perhaps fewer still were aware of the subtly burgeoning strength of the Grey team effort. The Greys actually outscored the Maroons in most activities during the fourth week, although they managed to drop both the wrestling match and the swimming meet.

The accumulated score showed the Maroons leading the Greys by a margin of 556 points, 5485 to 4929, which may indicate a reversal of the relative strengths of the two teams, in view of the fact that this is the first time that the Maroons have lost a week's competition, in this case by nearly 200 points.

New Wrestling Mats Baptised



Stubby the Iceman was joking with Andy Williams two weeks ago about cold drinks and hot women when the subject of softball surfaced and Stub, who has seen the game played by the local teams in Rumford and the counselor squads at Kawanhee, wondered how a Rumford vs. Kawanhee game might turn out.

Last week, following a lead to the Riverside Service Station outside Dixfield, Williams and Director of Player Personnel Mike Meserole met with Ed Provencher, coach of the Rumford Bucks and lined up a game for Sunday night, July 23rd at Kawanhee; the Bucks against a counselor all-star. team.

SRO at Button Field

In one of the busiest weeks in recent memory at Chip Button Memorial Field, a period of eight days that saw eleven Little League, Babe Ruth League and Counselor games, the Rumford-Kawanhee contest was the fitting cap on the hectic and exciting fourth week of the camp season.

The Kawanhee Counselors, taking a break from their private weekend war which the JC's lead four games to two, combined forces to engage the Bucks and fielded an awesome all-star squad that included: Mark Standen at third base, Mike Standen at shortstop, Scott Leiper at second, and Brian Birch at first. In the outfield, Billy Proctor was in left, Rumford-bred Pete Belskis in center, and Mike Meserole in right. Bob Zechiel received the nod as starting pitcher, with Andy Williams behind the plate.

The visiting Bucks, resplendent in black uniforms with orange and white trim which gave them a respectable look in the midst of the outrageous individual ensembles that the Counselors wore, arrived with a nine-man delegation, hometown fans and a six-car caravan. They did not, however, have with them their top two pitchers and in the game that followed it was obvious that the missing players were a vital element in the Bucks' strong second-place Rumford League standing.

In the nine inning, medium-fast pitch, no stealing, no short fielder ballgame, played before the largest baseball crowd to shoehorn its way into Button Field since the 1965 Little League All-Star Game, the Kawanhee Counselors beat

the Rumford Bucks, 18-10.

Counselors Grab Early Lead

Hurling for the Counselors, Bob Zechiel was sensational for five innings, scattering four singles and not allowing a runner past second base. In the field behind him there wasn't even the hint of an error. Offensively, the Counselors were devastating. Getting off to a quick 3-0 lead in the first inning and swelling the advantage to 8-0 by the fourth frame, they jumped on Buck starter Cuffy Stuart for ten hits before the Rumford team scored its first run.

Then in one big burst the score was 8-6. Four consecutive singles off Zeke in the top of the sixth got the Bucks rolling and they scored four times before Kawanhee got the first out. Two run-producing sacrifice plays hiked the Rumford tally to six before Zeke got out of the inning by forcing Buck lead-off man Tom Provencher to ground to Mark Standen. In the bottom of the inning the Counselors struck back with four runs, on a Pete Belskis double, an Andy Williams sacrifice, back-to-back singles by Mike Standen and Scott Leiper, and four Rumford errors.

Down 12-6, the Bucks refused to quit, however, and scored once in the seventh and three times in the eighth off Bob Altmaier, who replaced Zechiel after six innings. Whittling the Kawanhee lead to 12-10, it looked for the first time in the game as though the Counselors might revert to their normal weekend tendency toward reckless softball, but the collapse never materialized.

B. A. Saves Zeke's Victory

Leading off the bottom of the eighth inning, Williams

singled to right and quickly scored on Mike Standen's double. Then, with one away, Mike's brother Mark stepped to the plate and slammed an inside pitch into the left center field bleachers enabling both Standens to score and bringing the pro-Kawanhee throng, which included Mike and Mark's famous mountain-climbing parents, to its yelling and screaming feet.

Before the inning was out, Altmaier and Lorenzo (L.G.O.) Baker, the second-string All-Star battery, connected to drive in three more runs, making the score 18-10. Altmaier then strode to the mound, as the shadows lengthened across the Webb Lake Shore, and set down the Buck side in order in the top of the ninth to preserve the Ka-

wanhee victory.

Immediately after the game, arrangements were made by the two clubs for a rematch in two weeks, Sunday August 6th, at Kawanhee's Button Field. The Bucks will be returning with their starting pitcher. Stay tuned.

Half Season Stats Released

The Commissioner's Office released the half-season batting statistics last Monday and as usual for the first four weeks, there are several surprises. In the KLL, the Blue Plate Specials have four of the top five hitters, including Herm Tice, who is leading the league with an amazing .636 average, and Jim Markarian, who after only one hit in all of last year has five already this summer and a .333 average.

In the KBRL, the brilliant bat artistry of rookie Pete Burris heads the batting list with a camp-leading .692 mark. Veteran Lee McCleave, hitting .615, continues his incredible pace of last year and Mark Sengelmann is the league's premier power hitter.

In Sr.-Jr. Counselor softball, the big surprise was not in the renewed consistency of the league's top four batters, but in batter #5, one Nick Gill, who is tearing into SC pitching at a 481 clip and scoring practically every time he gets on base. For the Seniors, Camp Father Pete Gottert has taken up where retired C. F. Larry Pray left off last year, batting provided for both teams by Mark Standen and Bill Proctor, with Billy P. batting in with Billy P. batting in an astonishing 16 runs to date.

Report From the Raft

Second Kawanhee Yacht Club Regatta, July 22, 1972

On July 22, 1972, the wind was 5 to 10 knots from the Gap, the course was a triangle with the windward mark by Bass Rock and the leeward mark by Deep Beach with the Raft and Starting Mark 100 yards from Dee-Dee Reef. The Skippers in the Race were Jeff Colon-Bennett, Scott Mc-Minn, Tim Harrison, and Jeff Morgan. Crews were John

Duncan, Jeff Shaw, Andy Taylor, and Harry Wright.

The first heat proved to be very interesting. Jeff Morgan applied as he attempted to jibe around the leeward mark. With Morgan towed to shore to bail his boat out, the final standings for the first heat were Jeff Colon-Bennett, first; Tim Harrison, second; and Scott McMinn, third.

In the uneventful second heat, Jeff Colon-Bennett crossed the line well ahead of the other contestants, and Tim Harri-

son led Scott McMinn past the finish line.

The third heat was a very close race between Tim Harrison and Jeff Colon-Bennett. Although Colon-Bennett had a more favorable start, Tim Harrison overtook him for an early lead. Harrison nearly lost his advantage at the leeward mark, but Jeff was not quite able to overtake Harri-

son as the boats neared the finish line. The final standings were: Jeff Colon-Bennett (Grey), first with 13 points; Tim Harrison (Maroon), second with 11 points; Scott McMinn (Grey), third with 6 points; and Jeff Morgan, since he capsized early in the regatta and was not able to return, was awarded one breakdown point for the Maroons. The final team score was Greys 19 points, and Maroons had 12 points.

The wind was from the Gap at 16 to 20 knots on this clear day. The skippers were: Mark Sengelmann, Ralph Tice, Drew Rechsteiner, and John Duncan. The crews were: Fritz Lamb, Jon Blayman, Craig Bliss and Ed Poulton.

During the preliminary trial run of the course, John Duncan capsized in attempting to jibe around the leeward mark. This caused him to miss the entire first heat while he pumped out his boat. In the first heat, Mark Sengelmann took first, Ralph Tice took second, and Drew Rechsteiner rook isking. took third.

In the second heat, Ralph Tice suffered a broken rudder and was thus knocked out of the rest of the regatta. Mark Sengelmann again took first, John Duncan second, and Drew Rechsteiner took third.

Drew Rechsteiner capsized early in the third heat while he was attempting to tack up to the windward mark. Also, in the same heat, John Duncan broke off and lost his rudder while turning around the windward mark. Hence Mark Sengelmann had an easy run to first place.

In the final analysis, Mark Sengelmann (Grey), took first in the Regatta with 13 points. Drew Rechsteiner and John Duncan, the two Maroons, tied for second with five points, and Ralph Tice (Grey) came in third with four points. The team scores were Greys, 17 points; and Maroons, 10 points.

A Note from the Commodore on Regatta Scoring

Scoring in Kawanhee Yacht Club Regattas is based on what is known as the "High-Point System", whereby the person with the most number of points wins. By using this system, it is easy to add the points that one earns onto the team scores. The amassing of points goes like this: a person earns one point for starting, one point for finishing, one for coming in first (should he be lucky enough to accomplish this), and one point for each boat that he beats in the race. Hence, in the standard regatta arrangement that we have here, the winner should receive 6 points; the second place holder, 4; third place, 3; and fourth place, 2, according to the formula given above. There are, of course, slight variations at times due to the differing number of boats participating. Sometimes, a boat may be protested out of a race (earning a disqualification or DSQ), and hence no longer considered a participant. Also in this category are the boats which drop out of the race (earning a DNF — Drop out,

not-finishing — classification) and those suffering break-downs (BKD's).

The scoring for these latter three classifications is somewhat different than for the regularly finishing boats. That boat which is disqualified and receives a DSQ from the Race Committee receives no points whatever. The DNF person receives his one point for starting and nothing more. Finally, the calamity-befallen person who suffers a breakdown, or BKD, receives for that race the number of points equal to the average of all the points he earns in the remainder of the races he sails. Thus it is that DSQ, DNF, and BKD boats are scored differently and have a definite bearing on the total score outcome for a regatta as can be seen in the above Reports from the Raft.

So far, in the Kawanhee Yacht Club's Summer Series, the Maroons won the first regatta 23 to 7 over the Greys, but the Greys have pulled out the latest two regattas 19 to 12 and 17 to 10. So the Summer Series thus far finds the Maroons ahead 45 to 43.
