Weather Breaks, Greys Move

The most welcome and newsworthy item this week is the spectacular change in the weather here on Lake Webb. A "three day blow" brought us a succession of brilliant, clear days after a fairly wet opening week which played havoc with baseball and trip opportunities. A track meet on Saturday was happily completed under excellent conditions, and the final score for the first ten days of camp re-vealed that weather or not, the Greys had been on the move. The score showed the Greys led the Maroons 1992 to 1632. Maroon Captain John Duncan was undaunted and felt that it was too early to learn much from the tally. He also pointed out that he was coming down from Tumbledown as the Tug-of-War commenced, and that this may have made a bit of difference in his teams performance. Both Captains again reminded their teams that perseverance in pursuit of individual levels would ultimately make the difference, as a heat wave descended on Kawanhee.

As weather cleared during the second week of camp several trips left, while others were planned for the following week. Hawk Lodge climbed Mt. Bald, then did Tumbledown later in the week. Lynx spent the night on Tumbledown beside Crater Lake where they were joined by Badger. Both lodges had a great meal and a great night for star-gazing. The next morning was warm and brilliant, so everyone went swimming, and a few made use of John Ireland's inflatable raft which had been packed up the mountain by the Badgers. Earlier in the week Crow Lodge had joined Badger for a canoe trip on Sandy Creek. The water was high and swift: few were spared capsizing but everyone felt the trip was worthwhile. Sunday was the occasion for the first of a series of swimming trips to Coos

canyon; this was repeated on Monday. Clarence "Bates" Bateman's traditional Monhegan Island outing was to depart on Monday, July 9, embarking on the "Balmy Days" from Boothbay Harbor at 10:00 A.M. The trip has been so popular that it will again operate in two sections, the second scheduled to leave on Wednesday, July 11, at 6:30 A.M. Highlights of the trip will include a deep-sea fishing trip and a visit to Manana Island, just across the harbor from Monhegan, the haunt of Ray Phillips the famous sheep-raising hermit of Monhegan. Phillips has lived by himself on this tiny island for more than thirty-five years without electricity or plumbing. He collects rain water in barrels for washing and warms himself and cooks with a wood stove. Apart from fish, which has an important place in his diet, Ray is fond of pancakes and oatmeal. Many Kawanhee visitors bring him an orange, a candy bar, or a bit of tobacco. Ray Phillips appears healthy and happy and claims that a lot of his visitors would trade places with him—if they could. "I wanted to be independent, have a pleasant life outdoors," he said recently. "I settled my mind to leave the city in 1931. There was just me to think about.

I was never skillful enough to get married." Ray Phillips' home is a rough dwelling built from boards and drift wood. He lives in one room and shares the other

rooms with his sheep, his chief companion during the winter. He is never lonely during the summer; often 25 or 50 people come to visit.

Ray likes Kawanhee campers and is used to them. So is Monhegan. Because of Bates' shrewd planning and unflagging diplomacy, Kawanhee is the only camp allowed to pitch tents and camp out on the island. Those making the trip are (first section):

In the opener there were 42 walks in 4 innings totaling 19 runs. The Blue Plate Special Jrs. put up Freddie Borras against Tom Gyarfas of the Yellow Submarines. Trailing by 5 going into the bottom half of the last, the Subs ex-

ploded for 6 runs on six walks and a hit batsman. With one out and the bases full, little Bob Cook unloaded a two run double to right pushing across the winning runs. The final score was 15-14.

The second game featured the Red Necks against the Soylent Green. The Reds took an 8-4 decision on the 3-hit pitching of Matt Howard. Howard fanned 15 while the Soylent pitcher Squire Galbreath whiffed 13, giving up just 4 hits. A wild streak in the first by Galbreath produced 5 runs and put the game virtually out of reach for the Soy-

Howard collected his second victory at the expense of the winless Blues in a 12-1 tilt. "Mighty Matt" struck out 12 and allowed just 2 hits. Pete Shaw's lack of control and poor team defense led to the Blue's downfall.

# Family Slips By Tough Rebels, Card Second Straight Victory

The Coming of the Chief combined with The Coming of the Coming of the Chief combined with The Coming of the Monsoon Season canceled many a contest on drenched Button Field this past week, but right in accordance with a dubious schedule, the second Aaron softball game was somehow played. The featured contestants were Frank Finetto's Family, fresh and confident from their mobbing of Morgan's Marauders, and the untried and unproven team of John Ireland's Relate John Ireland's Rebels.

Both teams have their experienced players, and both teams have their rookies. One of the league's most experi-

enced players, however, was denied a contract because of his advanced age. Ageing utility-player Jim Beaver will not be playing Aaron Ball this season, to the detriment of the

league

The Rebels drew home team, so The Family came to the plate first. Pitcher Scott McMinn lead off the game with a single, followed by Pete Wetherbee, Mark Schiewetz, John Gill, and Tim Harrison, who did the same. Chris McGinnis walked and Chris Yardley had a double in the inning, and before the inning was over, the Family had batted around and tallied six times, for what was a seemingly insurmountable lead.

But in the bottom of the first, the Rebels rebelled against pitcher McMinn, and scored three runs. Bruce Benua lead off with a walk, and pitcher Jack Hexum followed with a double. Benua was cut down at third on the two-bagger, but the next batter, Dave Durell, smashed a double of his

own to score Hexum from second.

Cleanup man Kent Wallingford popped out, but captain-first baseman John Ireland slammed a triple to score Durell. Henry "Hank Aaron" Hauser followed Ireland with a single, scoring the captain. So before they went out onto the field, the Rebels had done two things: cut down a towering six run lead to a reachable three run lead, and proven that they could compete with the powerful Family.

The Family bided its time in the second, as Hexum settled down and allowed only one baserunner. The Rebel guns were also silenced in that inning, as they went down

The Family suffered a similar embarrassment, that is, going down one-two-three, in the top of the third. But the Rebels moved in their half of the inning. They scored an additional duo of runs, by virtue of Dave Durell's second hit of the day (he had four in the game), a booming triple,

and singles by Wallingford and Hexum.

Both teams were blanked in the fourth, and The Family managed only one baserunner in the top of the fifth. In the bottom of that inning, however, the Rebels wiped out the Family's one run lead and took the lead themselves by scoring twice. Captain Ireland's second extra base hit, this time a double, sparked the rally. Hammerin' Hank Hauser also pitched in with a single.

The Family discovered that it was behind for the first time in the game. So in the top of the sixth, they tied it up on two Hexum walks and a bunt single by McMinn. The Rebels couldn't break the tie in the bottom half of the

Mark Schiewetz, who had relieved McMinn in the fifth, coming in to pitch from his first base position which Mc-Minn then occupied, led off the seventh and final inning by reaching on an error. John Gill then slammed a triple, scoring Schiewetz, and scored himself on Tim Harrison's single. George Pierce added a single, and the Family had a two run lead.

A tough Schiewetz finished off the Rebels for good in the last of the seventh, allowing but one hit and striking out a batter. Thusly, then, did the Family notch their sec-

In the Knockabouts, Gull's skipper, John Aldrich, handily out-distanced the Hawk under Finetto. At precisely 1604 hours (4:04 P.M.), the Race Committee declared the Regatta completed.
