## TRIPS

### First Chain-O-Ponds Trip — 1973

Sixteen boys from Hawk and Deer Lodges, "Bates", Ken Chapman, and Mitch Greenawalt climbed into the camp truck on July 24 at 9:00 a.m. and bounced off toward the Chain-o-Ponds by way of Rangeley. We stopped for the traditional lunch of "P.B. & J.'s" at Cathedral Pines, a 300 acre plot of virgin Norway Spruce originally used for ship masts.

After lunch we continued along the Benedict Arnold Trail through the vast woodlands area owned by the Brown Paper Company and eventually arrived at the campsite toward the southern end of the ponds — a spot Kawanhee has used for several years.

Camp was quickly set up, and then we piled into the canoes to begin our explorations. We paddled about 1½ miles to the southern end of the chain, passing several small islands. On one island we spotted an enormous egg just barely out of the water, but we saw no bird near the nest. The boys took a dip near the dam and found that leeches abound in the water. On the return trip uplake against a moderate wind, we filled each canoe with driftwood so that we returned to camp with firewood enough for several meals.

Chef "Bates", with the able assistance of John Detrick and Whitaker Wright, served up a meal fit for hungry campers. After supper, the boys played "Capture the Flag," and went out in the canoes for some horseplay. At dusk we gathered around the campfire and listened to stories spun by "Bates" while sampling "cookie pies" (a specialty of the Greenawalt camping menu). These made a big hit and will undoubtedly become a highlight of future canoe trips. After cookie pies, stories about ghosts that turned out to be cows, Chief Pomona on Mt. We reached our campsite after a round trip of 12 miles and found Bate's famous stew all ready to be devoured. Cookie pies and stories about previous canoe trip experiences were on the docket for campfire time. For some reason, everyone went to bed early and sleep came fast.

On Thursday morning, we packed and put everything in the tents. Some boys went out on the lake and explored the shore. Mitch, Dave Lamb, and Chip Traynor took a canoe down lake to see the egg located the first day. Quietly, we drifted close and saw Mrs. Loon sitting on the egg. She let us get within 5 feet of her before she dived straight out and under the canoe.

The second Chain group arrived at noon; both groups packed into the truck for the trip to Canada. Two Puerto Ricans, a Canadian, and a Venezuelan threw the customs officer for a loop, but he agreed to let them cross the border. Everyone stocked up with goodies. Back at the campsite,



the first group loaded the truck for the trip home past the famous Sugarloaf Mountain area; we were back at camp by 4:30 p.m.

Memories of the trip will certainly include cookie pies, pancake flipping, all those small fish caught by Wynn Parrish, and the names of the canoes. The boys making the trip were John Detrick, Wynn Parrish, Peter Shaw (Pete's Paddling Porpoises); Tom Newbold, Bryan Day, Mitch Greenawalt (Mitch's Witches); Chip Traynor, Mike Harrison, Richard Seeley (Seeley's Sea Lions); Ken Chapman, David Lamb, Whitaker Wright (Wright's Knights); Charlie Abbott, Allan Cutler, Pete Seeley (Cutler's Capsizers); and Carlos Margarida, Miguel Nunez, Jose Rojo (the Spanish Armada).

#### The Snipe BETTY H.: Forty Years and Going Strong

The Snipe *Betty H.* has a history closely associated with that of Camp Kawanhee. Its story actually begins with two people, one, a teacher of Industrial Arts; and the other, a student in the teacher's class. The teacher was Mr. George R. Frank, and the student was Fred Heimberger, later to become a Vice-President of Ohio State University. In the early years of Kawanhee, George Frank was an avid supporter of sailing. In the Shop (then located where Crow's Nest now is) model sail boats were the foremost project.

In 1927, Dr. Heimberger came to Kawanhee in charge of the aquatics program. Soon afterwards, the Camp procured several sailboats. During one summer, Dr. Heimberger found a wrecked boat on the Lake shore. He patched up this boat, cut a spruce tree for a mast and was soon sailing this strange-looking vessel around Lake Webb. This experience, he says, really gave impetus to his love for sailing.

In 1933, George Frank thought that it would be a good idea for some counselors to build a full-sized sailboat so that the campers could see how a real boat was built. By this time, the present Shop had been built. Also during these years, Dr. Heimberger was doing student teaching and could only be at Camp for one month, thus he had left the Aquatics Department and was lending his able hand in the Shop. It thus came to pass that Fred Heimberger became the one commissioned to build Mr. Frank's "exhibition" sailboat. A better choice could not have been found at Kawanhee for the builder, for Mr. Frank had taught Fred Heimberger in his Manual Arts class to be exacting and rigorously accurate in detail.

After much searching and thought, the only two-year-old design of the new one-design Snipe class was selected as the type of boat best suited to be built in the Shop. Special boat woods were shipped to Camp, and Dr. Heimberger began the arduous task of constructing the boat.

At first there were many problems. The large three-inch white oak keel piece had been badly warped in shipment, and no amount of effort could seem to straighten it out. Hence, a new keel piece was laminated out of two oaken planks procured from a local sawmill. Next the garboards, the wide planks next to the keel, had to be properly set; and the centerboard trunk had to be so constructed so that it would not leak. In order to properly bend the difficult bottom planks, Fred wrapped the planks in burlap and held them for a while in the hottest water available at the showers in the brand-new Fort. With these  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch cedar planks in place, the basic hull was virtually completed by the end of 1933.

The following summer, mahogany splashboards and coamings were installed, a hollow box-mast was constructed, a "T-boom" was carved out, and the boat was fitted out with the proper rigging. The boat was a masterful addition to the small Kawanhee fleet. Soon after her launching in the summer of 1934, a contest was held among the Lodges for naming the new craft. In the Dining Hall, each Lodge placed its entry into a box. Later, a Master Camper who was helping in the Eagle Lodge, Walter Estabrook, was proud to state that his lodge, the Eagle Lodge, had won the contest. Hence forth, the boat would be named after the wife of the builder and would be known as the *Betty H.*

For forty years now, the *Betty H.* has been a part of the Kawanhee scene. During these years, she has gained a reputation as being a difficult boat to sail. As Dr. Heimberger himself points out, because of her design, the stern sometimes slips out when she jibes thus causing her to capsize. With this tricky character, the *Betty H.* has been sailing on her side quite often. One story that Dr. Heimberger tells is of a time when some boys took the *Betty H.* out and capsized her across the Lake. They managed to get the boat ashore, bailed her out, and sailed her back to Camp. As often happens in such circumstances, the Sailing Master was on the end of the dock to "give the boys a strong talking to." Shortly afterward, the Sailing Master himself took the helm and started out into the Lake. At nearly precisely the same point in the Lake, the *Betty H.* repeated her earlier performance much to the embarrassment of the humbled Sailing Master.

For a long time, the *Betty H.* was neglected and looked down upon. Most of this occurred because her original sails had fallen apart. When new sails were ordered, they were mis-measured and were more than a yard too short. With its stubby new mainsail, the *Betty H.* was slow and ill-responsive. For many years this condition remained, but in 1968, the boat received some repair and a new set of dacron sails cut to class regulations.

Today, after forty years, the *Betty H.* still is a tricky boat to sail. However, with her new large mainsail, she is once



again a competitive sailer. It also is a real credit to her builder that she is considerably water-tight. This summer, the Snip *Betty H.* qualifies to be registered with the Maine Antique Boat Society as a boat of historical value. As she was built very soon after the Snipe design (1931) was originated, she must be one of the oldest planked Snipes still sailing. This class of sailboat has been, through the years, one of the most popular classes, reaching a total registration of well over 30,000 boats world-wide. We at Kawanhee can be proud of the fact that we have one of the very first such boats; and we can be doubly proud of the fine workmanship that came out of our own Camp Kawanhee Shop: the Snipe *Betty H.* Sail on O Snipe!!

#### Second Bosuns' Regatta Completes the Sixth Regatta in the Summer Series — August 4, 1973

At 2:00, August 4th, four new Bosuns and their Crews set sail to compete in their first regatta. The wind was light and shifty, making sailing a course a very tricky business. With the wind shifting around northward from the Gap, Mike Haynes maneuvered his craft to best advantage round the course with the net result that he and crew Chip Zieg placed first. Bruce Field and crew Bob Bradway placed second. Eric Jensen and Steve Neri came in third with Tom Newbold and Wynn Parrish close behind.

In the second heat, the wind shifted around to the Nor'east which seemed to suit Bruce Field fine as he scampered around the course, crossing the finish line before any of the other boats had passed the windward mark. Mike Haynes finally pulled in for a second, with Tom Newbold, third; and Eric Jensen, fourth, undaunted by the hard downpour which accompanied this Race.

The Third Heat was somewhat frustrating as the wind died completely and then began shifting all over the place,

coming first from the direction of the Kawanhee Inn (Nor'east), then from the Narrows (South), then from Walker Mountain (Sou'west), and then from nowhere at all. This breeze was not at all to the liking of Eric Jensen who found himself far behind. Mike Haynes again managed to come in first with Field close behind. A few minutes later, Newbold finished with Jensen right behind.

By the beginning of the Fourth Race, the wind had died completely and sailing was simply for the birds. The Bosuns decided to invent some ingenious methods for moving ahead which were not quite legal. Bruce Field came in first; Jensen, second; Haynes, third; and Newbold, fourth. However, the Race Committee noted that during the Race, some interesting things had happened. Chip Zieg had started a new sailing fad by using a life cushion as a fan to help speed his boat along. Quickly, the new technique was taken up by all the boats, and the sight of flapping cushions was one to see. Other items which were not so nice (according to yacht racing rules) were also seen with the result that Bruce Field was protested by the Race Committee and disqualified for pumping sails (a violation of NAYRU Rule #49 as defined in Appendix 2 of the 1973 Yacht Racing Rules book). The same fate awaited Mr. Jensen who was discerned as sculling (violation of NAYRU Rules #49 as amended by the Sailing Instruction of the K.Y.C.). Mr. Haynes was disqualified for ooching (NAYRU #49 and Appendix 2) and for Pirating (K.Y.C. Sailing Instructions). Finally, Tom Newbold's crew helped disqualify that boat by paddling with his hand, causing Tom to be thrown out of the race by NAYRU Rules #49 and #60. With each boat disqualified in the Fourth Race, the results remained as they had been in the third with the result that Mike Haynes won the Regatta with 16 points; Bruce Field came in second with 14; Tom Newbold, second with 8; and Eric Jensen, fourth with 7 points.

It was a difficult regatta for these sailors, but I am certain that they learned a lot and are much improved sailors for the experience. Next summer will see them winning Regattas against the more advanced Second Mates.
