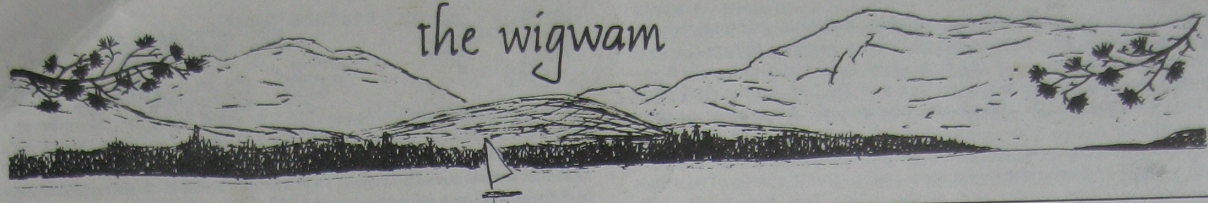

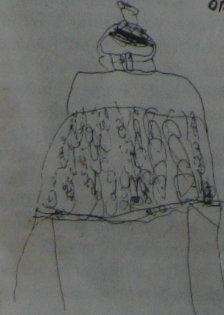

FUN WITH A DEADLINE

Perhaps at no other time in recent history have those iron-clad Kawanheisms of "Learn to do by doing", "Finish what you start", and "Fun with a deadline", been more in evidence than during that frenzied, rigorous period we'll remember fondly as pre-camp '83. Overshadowing all other routine projects were the construction of the new Fort; The stately new Loon Lodge and the still-to-come tennis courts were second and third priorities. This reporter was thrown into the site on the fifteenth of May, disguised as a construction worker, to help convert the dream into a reality. He knew not what he was in for.

Those early days were rough ones as I was not quite accustomed to rising at 5:30 and engaging in something called manual labor for a grueling 10-hour stretch six days a week. I was, after all, a student who had led up to that pond a mostly sedentary life. My superiors soon detected this. Nonetheless, I was all they had and the fort had to get done.

The core crew was made up of Tom Wojcik, myself, and the formidable, Billy Proctor, a Kawanhee institution, famous for his hard-working versatility and icy stare. When I arrived, the Fort was a mere 7-foot trench in the groundwell suited for congregations of bloodthirsty blackflies. The preliminary step was to measure out our corner stakes at the distance of 72 by 26 feet. This done, we poured a 16' wide concrete footing 4" high. On top of this, we, with the help of a local and colorful mason, erected a 7 block high frost wall. This wall, deep in the ground should keep the earth beneath the building from freezing, and prevent the severe frost from breaking the floor.

By Memorial Day weekend, two more hard workers had arrived. Spurred on by the promise of running water in the Dining Hall soon, Pam and Louisa soon found themselves out there digging trenches for the shower drain, and later, after 3 truckloads of concrete had been poured for the floor, toting 40lb. cinderblocks around the site. These had to be arranged in rows so that the mason could move right along. There are, by the way, at least 1,000 blocks underground alone. The novelty of construction work soon waned for Pam and Weiser, and they abandoned us for the kitchen, which is where girls belong anyway.

After a brief respite while the floor dried, the masonry work began again, with yours truly mixing all of the cement in a wheelbarrow, earning the dubious title of "mud man". It was about this time that Big John Detrick and son rolled in, equipped with all of the plumbing and fixtures, imported from Ohio.

By the middle of June we had a substantial crew at work on the fort, not quite as many as usual however. General consensus was that many staffers, who would otherwise have been early on the scene had heard somehow of all the hard work awaiting them at Kawanhee...

WRESTLING

In wrestling we learn safety; Which is important. Then we learn the theory of wrestling. We learn to score points: for example, a takedown, which is when a wrestler gains control of the other wrestler. This is worth 2 points. We also learn wrestling holds or moves, which are important. In general the types of holds used are takedowns (see above) and reversals, where the control of the wrestlers reverses. Escapes are when one wrestler escapes from the other who is in control. A pinning combination is a move or hold which forces the other wrestler to be pinned.

Everyday the wrestling instructor teaches specific holds or moves to the campers. The next day the camper remembers the move and does the move. If the move is done right, the camper passes the move.



ARCHERY

Archery is one of the most popular activities in camp. Thanks to new targets and a fine set of laminated wooden bows, the boys are very adequately equipped. Shooting from fifteen, twenty, thirty, forty, and fifty yards, the campers try and score as high as possible, earning pins as they go along. After a boy earns a pin at one distance he moves to the next distance working all the way up to fifty yards and finally, Robin Hood. The Robin Hood award is the highest award Kawanhee offers in archery. It can be achieved by scoring 500 points or better. An "RH" candidate shoots a combination of fifteen ends (includes six arrows per end) from thirty, forty, and fifty yards. As long as the weather holds up, this season looks to be a very promising one out at the archery range.

BOATING

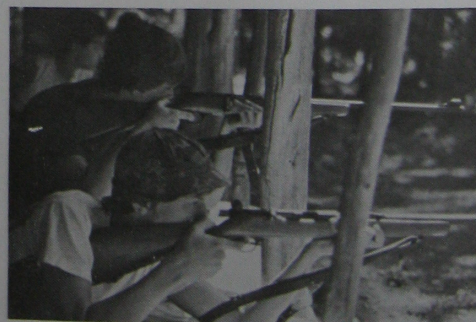

DEER TAKES TWO TRIPS

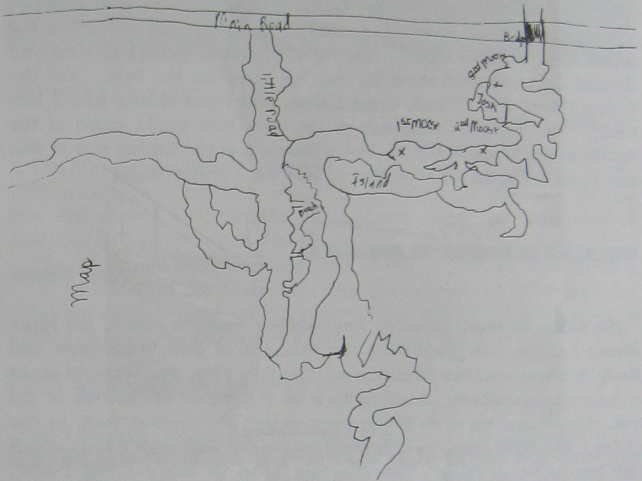

GREYS TAKE FIRST LEAD

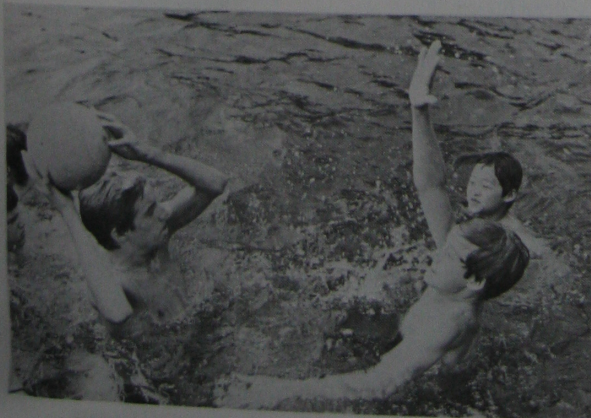

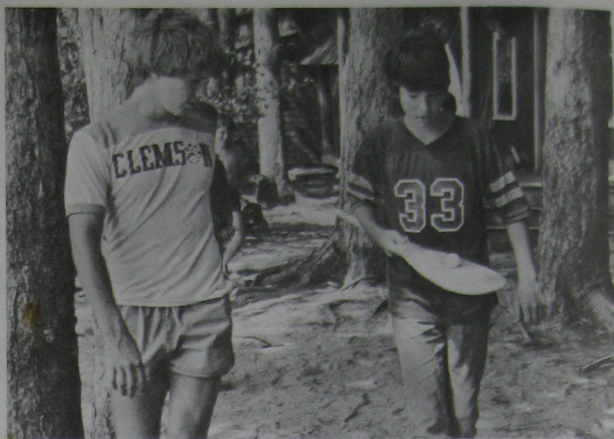
