
JULY 4th AT KAWANHEE BARBECUE AND MAROON-GREY "CAPTURE THE FLAG"

SOCCER REPORT

Off of buses, trains and planes from across the states and around the world stepped 284 talented feet headed for Camp Kawanhee and anxious to display their skill on the soccer field. No time was wasted as the season opener at Kawanhee Stadium featured Jerry's Kids and the Ramoner. Despite two Ramoner goals from Rob Studebaker, the 'Kids' seemed to rise from the dead for a come from behind team effort victory overcoming the Ramoners 5-4.

The following night the Junior Soccer league season opener drew record crowds as Todd's gods faced Felix's Cats. Reportedly due to contract holdouts the Cats played the entire game shorthanded and paid the price. Rookie Jaime Guasch showed he could play with the big boys netting 4 goals, leading the gods to victory 8-5, and earning the first Soccer Stud of the Week Award.

On a less than ideal playing surface after two days of rain, the Smurphy's kicked off against Castillo's Cowbellies. The Saturday night classic featured another Kawanhee rookie who dominated the pitch. The ominous reputation of the Kawanhee 15-under All Stars was enough to cause the cancellation of a match at Camp Manitou. The squad will therefore travel to Camp Wekeela on the 15th of July to enter a 5-team tournament where they hope to score often and come home victorious.

The 13-under Kawanhee All-Stars will travel to Camp Manitou on August 6 to show that even out of Kawanhee Stadium they can boot the ball between the uprights.

Well under way, it looks as though 1986 will be another super soccer summer on Lake Webb.

BASKETBALL ACTION

Now that the weather has cleared you could say the Basketball Department has gotten its feet wet. The slow start has been left behind and the action is becoming more and more intense. The three leagues have gotten underway, and potential abounds.

The season opener was between Kenny's Skywalkers and Ted Farmers. The Farmers got caught with a slow plow and were buried 70-28. Kenny Williams of the Skywalkers came within a point of the Kawanhee scoring record by pouring in 28 points. Other action in the KBL pitted the same Skywalkers against Kennedy's Kickbacks. The outcome was much closer, but again the Skywalkers came out on top 38-30. The size factor which favored the Kickbacks overwhelmingly was not enough to offset the balanced scoring of the Skywalkers. Bernie Gehret chipped in 22 points for the losers, 18 of which came in the first half. Scott Worthington's defensive plays helped baffle the Kickbacks, as he took two charges in very crucial situations.

In Mosquito League action the first game was between Garland's Gators and Koplitz's Cops. The Gators prevailed victoriously 31-8. Todd Worthington led all scorers with 11 points. In other action Al's Pals played Compher's Cruisers. The outcome was a victory for the Pals with a 33-24 final score. Edgardo Castillo led all scorers with 15 points. The third game of the week paired the two undefeated teams so far. Al's Pals were short-handed and got beat 35-11. Juan Ramos led all scorers with 14 points.

The Pee Wee League got rolling with two games. The first was between Wick's Wonders and Coon's Goons. The Goons prevailed in a much tighter game than the score indicated with a 22-14 point total. Andrew Meilling and David Lash tied with scoring honors of 12 each. The second game posted Compher's Creamators against Coon's Goons. The final score was 38-2. Josh Ruhle's presence was felt as he became the dominating offensive factor. Josh lead all scorers with 18 points.

League action has been very competitive so far, and the race for title has just begun.

Level work is well underway, and the enthusiam is rising now that the weather begins to improve. Kids are working hard in efforts to score points for their respective teams.
