Greys Gain but Maroons Retain Lead

The week's score provided both teams with a genuine cause for cheering. It showed that the Greys had jumped forward to take a bite out of the Maroons' advantage, but that the Maroons on the other hand had been moving fast enough to save the greater part of their over-all lead and to stay out in front. At the campfire of July 30, Dave Fergus unveiled a total score to date of: Maroons, 5428; Greys, 5099. In the preceding seven days, the Grey had won more points than the Maroons. Between July 23 and July 30, they amassed 2167, while their rivals collected 2072. This advantage of 95 points for the week reduced the Maroons' accumulated lead from 424 to 329. For the first time encouragement as well as good sportsmanship gave volume to the yell of Captain Whitney's Greys.

The Greys had been fighting on all fronts to make this gain. In the count of Achievement Level points, they led in five of the eight scoring departments, with Shop giving them the greatest boost of 505-to-255. In all departments the Greys completed eighty-five levels for a total of 2010 points, while the Maroons were adding up seventy-five worth 1875. In sports events, the honors had been evenly divided, with the advantage in points going to the Maroons. The 18-0 shellacking inflicted on the Maroons in the baseball game Saturday morning had scored 75 points for the Greys to 25 for the losers. That afternoon, however, the tables were turned when the Maroons handed the Greys a 172-82 drubbing in the water meet.

A total of one hundred and sixty levels were polished off during July's final week. The Athletic Department continued to lead the whole field by a wide margin, recording forty levels worth 1045 points. Runner-up activity was the Shop which was just beginning to hit its stride as more and more projects, begun earlier in the season, reached completion and paid off in points. The week's count in the Shop was twenty-nine levels scored at 760 points.

Six Guide Candidates Attend Bemis Camp

On Wednesday, July 27, a group of six Kawanheecians (A. Hoster, M. Mathews, R. Mathews, H. Morton, W. Roys and this reporter, A. Downey) left for the Junior Maine Guide Test Camps in Bemis on scenic Lake Mooselookmeguntic. Unfortunately the weather man beat us to the camp site and rain greeted us on our arrival. For two and

a half hours we worked setting up the camp with rain running down our faces and over our ponchos.

With the advent of evening the rain departed, leaving seventy-two weary candidates from twelve different summer camps gathered around a warm campfire on Bemis Point. Kawanhee's own Bates gave a very interesting talk on gold panning and the history of gold in Maine. The sun set on our first day of this new and different experience as we hit our soft and hard-earned sacks.

At 6:30 the next morning we woke to the sound of a crackling fire and the bite of a fine axe in dry cedar. The sun was shining on the test area as we went down to the headquarters tent for our day's assignment. The first five pages of our written test, axemanship and canoeing, were our orders for the day. These all went well, except for canoeing. In this subject, we Kawanheecians learned a few new tricks then and there, but not soon enough to help our performance.

After a dinner of American Chop Suey (a variation of spaghetti and meat balls) we joined the whole camp at a council fire. We heard some very interesting stories on the background of the Bemis area, followed by an amusing story called "Stratamagee" (Strategy to you!).

Friday we rose early after a very cold night, ate breakfast, and went down to headquarters. "Finish up written tests (six more pages), wet day fire, topographical map, canoe repair, personal shelter, compass course, and map of the territory" were our orders. This schedule was intended I'm sure to drive us all insane with running from one end of the test camp to the other and back again many times. Wet day fires were our primary hurdle at 9:30 A. M. We had to use green cedar for the test because it was the best we could find in the area at the time. Most of our boys missed this one on the first trial, but the Senior Guides were kind enough to allow another try Saturday morning. Mike Mathews, Bob Mathews and Bill Roys all made it the second time. We had another council fire that evening at which Les Miller told us more stories about Bemis "in the good old days." Darkness reigned over us and six mentally fatigued young gentlemen slept out their last night in the 1955 test camp.

The next morning we finished our tests. At 2:15 P. M. on Saturday, July 30, we waved good-bye to Bemis and Lake Mooselookmeguntic through the back window of the camp truck and headed home. We felt enriched and filled with new ideas on camping and cooking and life in the wilderness.

Did we pass? That will not be known until full reports are made out and sent to the Franks. This much can be said: We met the swellest bunch of guys and Senior Guides in the State of Maine, and we had an experience which we shall not forget for long years to come.

Welcome, Kawanhee, to the Junior Maine Guide Program. May it instill in your boys a feeling of security and comfort in the art of living out of doors in Maine!

Large Audience Applauds Lodge Stunts

With a flourish of trumpets, the long delayed Kawanhee theatrical season of 1955 took to the boards on the evening of Friday, July 29. The Yenser-Hirsch management warmed up the Rec Hall with a bill composed of four lodge skits, several instrumental solos, and the strains (?) of the recently organized band.

Under Maestro Yenser, the camp's orchestral aggregation blasted out a spirited overture. It sailed into *Anchors Aweigh*, picking up volume as additional horn players drifted in from the showers and the baseball game, and land solidly with *Sing, Sing, Sing*. This led into the first two instrumental specialties, Klaus Thomas beating out a bit of boogie on the piano, followed by Bill Hauser's trumpet solo of *Cherry Pink and Apple Blossom White*. The remaining musical offering was an entr'acte later in the evening supplied by Jim Murphy when he played *Melody of Love* and *Marche Militaire* as flute solos.

The dramatic end of the program, with Junior Program Director Tony Hirsch introducing the several lodge presentations, had its customary satirical flavor. The Pine Trees aimed their wit at a well known TV feature by producing an act entitled *This Is Your Life — You Can Have It!* This biography of Bullfighter Billy Wassell was sponsored by such gruesome products as Caramba Frozen Cactus Juice and Casey's Cozy Coffins, and it was moved along at a brisk pace by a very able Master of Ceremonies, Don Casto. J. Fish was an eye-filling Esmerelda and D. Hayward, as the recipient of a birthday cake, enjoyed an eyeful of another type.

In the same vein of kidding the airways, the Crows staged *Radio Station P-U-B-O*, a skit notable for its clever lines and the polished performance of N. Robbins as the M. C., Moderator, or What-have-you. In behalf of various products which, when spelled backwards, never seemed to spell anything of significance anyway, he presented attractions ranging from the pithy replies of Mr. John J. (Bill Hadley) Agony to a poetry hour conducted by Bill Diehl,

while the audience gave continuous and audible evidence of its enjoyment.

Inevitably Kawanhee's higher-ups came in for their share of caustic comment when the Birch Lodge took over with a number purporting to represent a counselors' meeting. By this time the roles of Bates and George Frank must have been filled by almost as many actors as have attempted Hamlet, but the fact did not prevent D. Hoch and C. Westrater respectively from turning in entirely fresh interpretations. Impersonations which particularly tickled the audience were the "Frannie" of T. Wittlig and the "Howell Windle" of D. Beggs.

The evening was rounded out by the Falcons' circus skit. Tim Hirsch and L. Andre were an unusual set of Siamese twins, and Bruce Connor stole the show as the Fat Lady. This turn brought down the curtain on one of the more successful "first nights" in Kawanhee history.

Saturday's Games and Sunday's Services

The first special event of the week end, a clean-up of the grounds immediately adjacent to each lodge prior to lodge inspection in the morning, was hailed with no particular enthusiasm, but the schedule soon settled into its more welcome round with the Maroon-Grey baseball game. A generous and varied program of water sports, planned by Jack Welton and Gardner Defoe, provided entertainment for the afternoon, and the standard Junior Counselor-Senior Counselor game after supper had the standard outcome — the Seniors won! The traditional little ceremony of the Winds opened the campfire on Council Point, with Fred Hoster first lighting the fire of the North Wind, and J. Whitney, Ray Brown and Mike Mathews kindling the other winds around the compass. A novelty of the evening was the vigorous, but largely frustrated attempt on the part of Mike Smith to impress the Harvard football song on this *Fight-the-Team*-minded camp. The meat of the campfire was provided as usual by the awards, the score and the Dean's story.

Sunday produced the perfect morning for church services in the chapel on the shore, so it was against the background of the blue lake and the distant heights of Tumble-down that Kawanhee listened to Dr. Elmore. His sermon dealt with a highly imaginative zoo and was addressed specifically to the younger campers. Another impressive passage in the service came with the singing of *The Old Rugged Cross* by a quartet composed of Mr. George Frank, Mr. Raymond Frank, Mr. William Heimberger and Mr. Ben Bennett. In the afternoon, a team of counselors played host to the Dixfield Dixies on Kawanhee's Diamond No. 1, but took no revenge at all for last week's defeat in Dixfield. The vesper assembly in the Recreation Hall brought the first full scale performance of the Glee Club. Herb Yenser led his large group of choristers through five selections ranging from *The Happy Wanderer* to Malotte's setting of the Lord's Prayer. With the last as an introduction, Dean Miller spoke briefly on the meaning of the Lord's Prayer to bring the day to a quiet close.

Dixies Batter Kawanhee Again

Kawanhee lost its second game to Dixfield, Sunday, July 31, by a score of 11-6. Playing on their own field, the Kawanhees out-hit Dixfield 12-8, but also out-erred them 8-1, and thereby hangs the tale.

Jim Gest got the Braves off to a lead in the first inning with a two-run homer that bounced into the woods in left field. Abe Whitney's walk and Jock Duncan's triple down the right field foul line made it 3-0 at the end of the inning.

Then Dixfield came back with four in the second and two in the third to take a commanding lead. Two more in the fourth, one in the fifth, and two in the sixth clinched the victory with room to spare for the Dixies.
