Maroons Build Lead to Four Figures

The Maroons had every reason for rocking the Rec Hall with their cheer Saturday evening—and did! The mid-season tally of points showed that they had once more been in there pitching and in the fourth week of activities not only had held, but also had increased, their lead again. At the campfire of Saturday, July 27, the announced score was: Maroons, 5915; Greys, 4760. Scoring during the preceding week had amounted to: Maroons, 2105; Greys, 1785. Thus the Maroons had added 320 points to the advantage of 835 which they had held on July 20. They therefore entered the second half of the season with a favorable balance of 1155 points—very good going indeed! The Maroons may have a Davenport for a captain, but they certainly aren't lying down on him—or on the job at hand. (Oops, we've been trying to suppress that crumbly pun all season, but at least it is out of the way now!)

While Levels as usual provided the bulk of the week's score, Maroon-Grey sports events for once could be considered as the factor which tipped the scales. The Maroons made a clean sweep of the week's two team clashes. They picked up the 100-point award for the baseball game of Sunday, July 21, and the 200 riding on the water meet of Saturday, July 26. These 300 points virtually told the tale of the Maroons 320-point gain for the week, and the water meet's 200 points alone could have shifted the balance. There might well have been some gnashing of teeth among the Greys at the reflection that it was only a third of a length which won the war canoe race which won the water meet which won the week.

As for the Levels of the week, it is not often that the points have broken so evenly: 1805 for the Maroons; 1785 for the Greys. Sailing was the period's most productive department, reporting a total of 805 points (Maroons, 405; Greys, 400) for thirty-seven ratings of Novice, Crew, Bosun, etc. Athletics produced twenty-one Levels which earned the Greys 380 points, and the Maroons 300.

Rain, Trips, Barbers Trim Week's Schedule

Trips and the weather occasionally deflected the week's schedule from the precise courses charted for it, but offered no real impediments to the momentum of activities. One or both of these conditioning elements, or maybe just a long Little League game Tuesday night, may have accounted for the concentration of the weekly movie into a single continuous showing Wednesday evening. The main picture was *Young Daniel Boone*, but one of the shorts was more provocative of enthusiasm. Entitled *Football Parade of 1956*, it included some shots of Ohio State in action. The week's other big entertainment feature also showed up on Wednesday, when the camp barbers played a "one-night stand" in the Rec Hall during the afternoon. Talk about making the fur fly! That evening found more indecently exposed ears in camp than are likely to be seen again this season!

The weather made its big play with drenching rains Monday morning. Climatic conditions for the remainder of the week varied from good to serviceable except for some precipitation (A fifty-cent word used by forecasters when they don't want to scare away the tourist trade!) Wednesday afternoon and sporadic week-end showers beginning after the water meet Saturday. It may smack of Pollyanna to speak smugly of damp days, but Kawanhee may at least realize that it has little cause for complaint when it compares its lot with that of southern New England, plagued by severe drought which closes the fire-endangered woodlands to many phases of camping. In this region of Maine, the forest fire hazard has not been reported above the lowest, or minimum danger, zone since the beginning of the camp season.

Variety was the order of the week in the Trip department. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday found the camp's more experienced climbers in New Hampshire scaling Mt. Washington and the other peaks of the Presidential Range with Ed Chace. One-day trips to Popham Beach for surf bathing in the Atlantic were run on Tuesday and Friday, the first of these expeditions with the Messrs. Kerr, Greene, and Stanley serving as trip assistants to Bates. On Thursday, Forrest Dexter conducted Mineral Trip No. 3 of the season, with a personnel drawn from the Pine Tree, Deer and Moose lodges. Firsthand reports on two of these trips may be found below.

Presidential Expedition a Major Success

The 1957 Presidentials Trip left camp one day late. Scheduled for Monday, July 22, the heavy rains on that day postponed the trip to Tuesday, July 23. At the wheel of the small truck was Mr. R. C. Frank, and at the wheel of his own car was Pop Nowold. Fourteen members of the party were to be found in various parts of each vehicle.

The party was made up of Clay Davenport, Sturg Dorrance, Ben McCoy, Johnny Stiles, Charlie Sarich, Bill Wassell, Tom Knowlton, Sim Savage, Dick Spooner, Bill Boothby, Steve Davies, Clint Meserole, Tally Krumm, and Ed Chace, counselor.

Leaving camp at 9:35 A.M. and stopping once in Gorham, N. H., for woolen socks and other essentials, the party was deposited at the Pinkham Notch A. M. C. Camp at 12 noon. Ten minutes later the boys were on their way up Tuckerman Ravine toward the famous Headwall. At 12:30 P.M. the party stopped at the Crystal Cascades for a trail lunch of sandwiches, oranges, cookies, and chocolate bars. Many of the boys snapped pictures of the cascades.

At 2:00 P.M. the Kawanhee climbers reached the Tuckerman Shelter at Hermit Lakes and saw the great Headwall where, to their disappointment, there was no snow. In 1956 the boys had found a large quantity of snow. Here Ed spaced out the members of the party for the climb up the Headwall. The training on Tumbledown Mountain Chimney Trail served them well here. Gorgeous panoramas were on both sides. Above to the left was Boott Spur, and to the right Lion Head. Great clouds were scudding past the summits.

At 3:45 P.M. they arrived at Tuckerman Junction where the various trails meet. Here they took the trail by-passing the summit of Washington and leading to the Lakes of the Clouds Hut maintained by the Appalachian Mountain Club. They arrived at the Hut at 4:15 P.M., four hours and fifteen minutes after they had started. Along the way Ed Chace, Sturg Dorrance and Ben McCoy took pictures. Ben had his own darkroom with him and when he didn't like a picture he had taken and developed, he took another. Tally Krumm took movies.

Soon the low ceiling of clouds closed in on the Hut and made impossible a trip up Mount Monroe directly across from the Hut. Following a delicious meal of soup, roast beef, nut bread and vegetables, the boys spent the evening playing cards and talking with members of two other camps staying at the lodge. Most of the party assisted in making trail lunches for the next day, washing and wiping dishes, and sweeping the floor. One camper watching Steve Davies do light housekeeping was heard to say, "If she could only see him now!"

The next morning dawned clear and very cold. The temperature at 5000 feet was 37 degrees. During the night Ed Chace dreamed that the Cog Railway was coming into the Hut sleeping quarters. He awakened to find that it wasn't the Cog Train at all, merely one of the hearty mountain-climbers snoring. Ed took his bedding to the dining room to sleep on the table.

After breakfast at 7:00 A.M., the Kawanhee hikers headed up Mount Washington where they were disappointed to see clouds coming in from the west. They made the top non-stop in 45 minutes. Here they spent an hour and a half exploring the summit, the Weather Bureau and the hotel, and writing cards home. Steve Davies bought a hatful to send to his mother — so he said! Others invested in "bargains" at the souvenir shop, affectionately called "The Robbers' Den". Still others, more mechanically minded, investigated the Cog Railway trains. Bill Wassell learnedly informed the campers that it was actually a "rack" railroad, but was unable to expand on that term.

At 10:40 A.M. the party took off down Washington toward Mt. Clay and its three peaks. Many pictures taken along the edge of the Great Gulf will recall to the boys the beauty of the mountains that morning. By 12:00 noon the party had covered all three peaks of Clay and stopped at the junction of the Clay Loop and the Gulfside Trail to

eat a trail lunch. Soon a light drizzle fell. Charlie Sarich in his poncho looked so much like one of the rocks that Dick Spooner inadvertently sat on him. The group had every intention of ascending the peaks of Jefferson and Adams, but when it reached the Jefferson Loop, heavy hail and rain fell and continued to fall on the descent to Edmands Col and the new steel shelter there. Here it was necessary to wait for at least thirty minutes.

At 2:25 the climbers left, headed for Mt. Adams. Just as they reached the Adams Loop, with the sun brightly shining and all in the party in agreement that they would climb the peak, Ed sighted a heavy thunderstorm over Randolph, headed directly toward them. The plans to climb the peak were scrapped and the boys took off along the trail around the peak toward the Madison Lakes Huts which are located in the gap between Adams and Madison. All records were broken on that run. Just as the storm broke, the last of the boys climbed down the slope and entered the A. M. C. Hut. Other climbers were not so lucky and were soaked to the skin.

The Hut men had hot cocoa and tea ready. Most of the party loafed on their bunks. Steve wrote more cards—to his mother, so he said! The dinner at Madison was excellent. Meat loaf replaced the beef, but the dinner was grand and the quality and quantity excellent. The rain prevented any climbing of Madison that evening. Here Charlie Sarich won the Madison Lakes Chess Championship, and here he also achieved fame as a dish rinser. Bridge, hearts, and solitaire games enlivened the evening. Steve wrote more cards.

The next morning after breakfast at 7:00 A.M., the boys assisted in the kitchen, and swept the bunkroom. Departure was delayed until 10:25 A.M. because the descent to the Ravine House would take only two hours and it seemed better to kill some time high on the mountains. When the boys left, there were some dissenting votes about climbing Mount Adams. When they finally did climb it, however, all were happy because the views from its conical summit were magnificent. Soon they started down the Durand Ridge Trail, stopping only once on the Knife Edge to eat lunch. They arrived at the Ravine House at 2:10 P.M. to find Bates and the big truck awaiting them.

Highlighting the trip were the comments in both A. M. C. huts that "your camp is the best we've seen". These were welcome words and were deserved. We had a grand group. Each boy co-operated to make the trip successful and every Kawanheecian and parent can be proud of our boys. It was a grand trip.

The heights of the peaks in the Presidential Range are: Washington, 6288; Clay, 5532; Jefferson, 5715; Adams, 5798; Madison, 5363; and Monroe, 5385. The Gulfside Trail is from 4825 to 6020 feet above sea level. Actually, for three days the party was at least 4825 feet above sea level.

Surf and Old Fort Highlight Popham Trip

Twenty-seven members of the Polecat, Pine Tree and Hawk lodges swam in the ocean surf at Popham Beach, Friday, July 26. This trip to Popham was the second of the year, a group from the Lynx, Wildcat, Bear, Badger and Crows' Nest lodges having gone to the beach the preceding Tuesday.

The Friday trip traveled in Bates' Bouncing Buggy and Forrest Dexter's pickup truck, going through the twin cities of Lewiston and Auburn and the old shipbuilding town of Bath. Jim Parker, Bill Keating and Dave Fergus assisted

Bates and "Dex" on the trip and supervised the surf bathing as life guards.

Exploring Fort Popham occupied the boys when they arrived at the shore. This massive structure, left uncompleted during the Civil War due to the rapid improvement in other fortifications, stands at the mouth of the Kennebec River. This fort only dates back to 1861, and has no connection with the very early history of Popham, which was the scene of the earliest English attempt to establish a colony in New England. This settlement was made by George Popham in 1607, but did not survive the severities of the first winter. Fort Popham was made a state park in 1924 when it was deeded to the State of Maine by the Secretary of War, John W. Weeks.

After lunch at the fort, the campers hiked a mile up the beach to prepare for their swimming, which consisted of several short dips in the cold breakers. During these dips, Mr. R. C. Frank made movie stars of the campers, photographing them for the camp movies. To separate the dips, the group hiked up the beach to a picturesque head of land which was connected with the beach by a hundred-yard-wide strip of sand. The head became an island later in the day when the tide came up and covered the sand strip.

After the swim and a stop in the beach store, Bates and Mr. Dexter drove everyone back to camp for *Taps*, stopping for supper by a small lake along the way.

The Hornets brought in another run in the fifth and boosted their total to two.

Hornet pitcher Terry Lawrence set the Termites down in order in the first frame but cracked up in the second. He issued six free passes and three runs crossed the plate. Bruce Connor came in to pitch the third inning and held the Termites scoreless. They erupted, however, in the fourth and Peter Burke came in to relieve Connor. Before Burke struck out the ninth batter of the inning for the third out, six runs had come in. Four walks, five errors and the Termites' first and only base hit of the ball game were responsible. As if nine runs were not enough, they scored two more in the fifth, coming from three errors.

The Termites had one "Texas League" hit during the entire game, but an outlandish total of twelve walks by the pitchers and eight errors committed by the fielders were the cause of the Hornets' downfall.

On July 27, Bill Dutcher of Columbus, Ohio, arrived in Kawanhee to assume the position of Junior Counselor in the Eagle Lodge and to serve as an assistant in the Campcraft Department. Bill, a Junior at the Columbus Academy, is well remembered as a Kawanhee camper, having spent five previous summers on the shores of Lake Webb, the most recent in 1955. They are spending this summer in New England before moving to Pasadena, California, in September.

Of the same rare and early Kawanhee vintage are Mr. and Mrs. Noel Piersche, of Columbus, Ohio, who are spending the last week of July and the first week of August in their cottage near the Inn. A period of all-out reminiscences about "the good old days" seemed imminent with the scheduled arrival of Dr. and Mrs. Frederic Heimberger of Ohio State University on July 29 to spend August at their summer home in Weld.

Both the campfire of Saturday evening, July 27, and the Sunday morning service took place in the Recreation Hall.
