Gill Takes "Sexy Remy" As Hertz Clobbers Cooke

John Gill, last season's "everybody's everything" and more or less out of the limelight for the most part of the 1970 season, reasserted his hold on the KLL's most valuable player ranking as he led the Hertz Division All Stars over the Cooke Division glitter squad in a devastating show of strength, 23-6, in Kawanhee's mid-season classic. Putting

However, while not voted to any of the eight supporting positions on the field, there was never any doubt that Hertz manager, Bob Altmaier, would start the lanky right hander on the mound. As star of the show, Gill reacted brilliantly giving up only one hit in his allotted three innings before moving to left field.
