J.M.G. Hopefuls Hoe Tough Row at Bemis

On Monday, August 2, eight of Kawanhee's "best in campcraft" left for an adventure which was actually to change their way of thinking in the art of living out of doors. They set out in the Bouncing Buggy for the testing grounds of the Junior Maine Guide program at Bemis, Maine, there to embark as candidates upon three days of tests and examinations. Whether the boys "passed" or not is insignificant, because the knowledge and experience which they gained from their trip will be with them wherever they go.

The boys camped under some of the most adverse conditions possible in the state of Maine, for they were camping in virgin wilderness. To make the situation even more of a challenge, the elements opened up and the boys showed their true drive when they were determined enough to pitch camp in the rain.

The boys were tested by six Camp Guides who are regular staff members of the Junior Maine Guide program. The boys were submitted to what may well be the most thorough test of cumulative campcraft skills ever developed. The contestants come from all parts of the New England states.

After covering canoeing, compass work and axmanship in the second day, the boys were ready to enter into the most difficult portion of the examinations, the written tests and the ordeal of building wet-day fires. The campers had to prepare meals which included baking, frying, and boiling on their open campfire. The meals were sampled by the Camp Guides. They were tested in first aid, canoe repairing (using materials at hand), map making, knowledge of trees, axmanship, etc.

Of the eight boys making the Bemis Trip two members had the honor of completing, to the satisfaction of the Camp Guides, the entire program, thereby receiving their Jr. Maine Guide Certificate and a luncheon at the State House in Augusta. These two boys were Lorenzo Baker and Ralph Tice.

The other six boys missed passing by a few points. They will be better prepared next year by their vast experience gained during the testing of 1971. The boys making the trip were: Ralph Tice, Lorenzo Baker, Alan Sweet, Manuel Vinas, John Duncan, Peter Wetherbee, Lee McCleave, and Tom Ruhle, a former Jr. Maine Guidesman, supervised the trip, and prepared the boys for their tests.

Big "Noyes" from N. Uxbridge

In the two years he won the KLL most valuable player award, John Gill never did it. Back in 1963, when they were burning up the league, Freddie and Frankie Viejó couldn't pull it off. Craig Wolcott, even in his combat-boot days couldn't get near it. And Lance and Lindsay Volk never even dreamed of it. The cream of The Kawanhee Little League from 1961 when Tommy Cookman was pitching for The Red Bears to 1970 when Joe Underwood was hurling for The Hapless Purple Lepidolites, has never managed to throw a perfect game — six innings, eighteen up, eighteen down. Last Monday night, Hollis Noyes Macomber did it, pulled it off, got right on top of it and dreamed about for the rest of the night — eighteen up, eighteen down.

En route to his gem, H. Noyes struck out twelve and didn't allow a ball to get out of the infield as The Blue Crew beat the slumping Green Gestapo, 1-0. The victory boosted Macomber's record to 4-0 and gave the terrific ten-year his second no-hitter of the season.
