A wild celebration ensued in the dining hall as the Maroons piled on top of each other and Chuck and assistant captain, Bernie Gehret jumped off the high board to celebrate their victory.

For the Greys and their great captain, Fly MacPeak it was a disappointing end to a valiant try. They had tried as hard as they could and their effort was just short. It was a job well done by both teams as the closeness of the score indicated. Job well done by both teams and captains!







It was a fun evening and Steven Speilberg will be in touch.



It has to be one of the best play-off games in KLL history. That was the story when the last place Green Waves took on the undefeated Whiteheads in the first round of the play-offs. The game took some two hours and 45 minutes to complete and when the dust had settled on Chip Button Memorial Field the Green Waves had emerged with the biggest up-set victory of the season, a thrilling 10 to 9 come-from-behind win. The Heads started strong with four runs in the first inning off Ace pitcher of the Waves, Todd Worthington. They also had a single run in the 2nd and a final 4 big runs in the bottom of the 4th to closeout their scoring at 9. This set the stage for the dramatic finish by the Green Wave team. With eight runs scored through the first 5 innings the waves were facing their last at bats in the top of the 6th. With one out the Waves got a break when Erik Fuhrmeister was hit with a pitch sending him to first. 
ARCHERY REPORT

NUMBER 90 FOR BATES


Over the years the best known and best loved Kawanhee Staff Member in a runaway decision is Clarence F. Bateman. Ever since the early 1930 era, BATES has continued to make his indelible mark upon the lives of campers and counselors. "Bates' Bouncing Buggy" has been a familiar phrase to all Kawanheeans who rode the bumpy roads to Tumbledown, Blue and other exciting Maine Tripping scenes. The lure of gold panning was always more thrilling because Bates made certain every boy arrived back at camp with at least a few flakes of the precious metal. The hundreds of Mainers befriended by Bates provided him with an invaluable source of where to go and what to do in Maine. One fascinating Indian Maine guide contracted with Bates to build bird houses, and these were re-sold by Bates to generations of Kawanhee campers and staff. The crowning achievement for Mr. Bateman was his superb P.R. job in maintaining the excellent relationship between the natives of Monhegan Island and himself. This resulted in a carryover of good will which even today enables Camp Kawanhee to be accepted happily and with open arms by the good people who live on the island--today we are still the only camp permitted to camp behind the lighthouse and remain camping on the island for five days. On August 18 Bates celebrated his 90th birthday. Perhaps we can all drop him a congratulatory card at 1329 Murrell Ave., Columbus, Ohio 43212. BATES IN THE LAKE!


