Archery Report by Nancy von Honert

Archery concluded its most successful season ever with a record 567 medals and 21 Robin Hoods being awarded. Two highlights of an outstanding summer occurred when Darren Belskis and Jason Gardner earned their Junior Olympic Archery Development Master Archer award. This award requires shooting a score of 230 points with 30 arrows from the 50 meter line. Although the Master Archer award is one of the highest honors awarded in Archery, each boy who came to Archery with a willingness to learn and improve deserves special praise. Congratulations to every camper who earned a medal or a trophy during this season.

The department instituted a Junior C Robin Hood program this season whereby a Junior C archer was required to shoot 30 arrows from the 15 and 20 meter lines for a total of 60 arrows and a final score of 300 or better. Four campers earned this award this summer. They were Rees Alexander, Alex Smith, Jeronimo Velarde, and Ricardo Velarde.

Requirements for the Junior B Robin Hood were increased so that a Junior B archer was required to shoot 30 arrows from the 20, 30, and 40 meter lines for a total of 90 arrows and a score of 500 points or better. James Chagaris, Dan Crane, Jaime Lastra, and Julien Warner were successful in their efforts to earn the Junior B Robin Hood.

Junior A Robin Hood requirements were also increased so that Junior A archers were required to shoot from the 30, 40, and 50 meter lines for a total score of 500. Only three campers, Joey Clarke, Ramon Gaztambide, and Forbes Rigsby, earned this award.

Senior Robin Hood distances were changed to 40, 50, and 60 meters with a total score of 500 points. Senior Robin Hood award winners were Enrique Amerigo, Chris Atwell, Matt Berg, Sean Duncan, Maroon Captain, Tom Papa, and Andrew Wilkins.

The Olympic Robin Hood distances were kept at 40, 50, and 60 meters, but the total score was increased to 600 points. Winners of the Olympic Robin Hood trophies this summer were Darren Belskis, Kurt Coursen, Nate Duncan, and Jason Gardner.

Finally, ladder leaders as of August 6th, Ricardo Velarde, Ramon Gaztambide, Matt Berg, Kurt Coursen, and Darren Belskis, were treated to pizza and coke. Competition was very fierce in the 12 & under categories, and special mention should be made of Joey Clarke who led until August 5th.

Chuck and I would again like to thank Amy Spencer for her outstanding contribution to this successful season, and we would like to recognize our fine C.I.T.'s, Darren Belskis, Brad Fichter, Gerard Tolosa, and Andrew Wilkins for their terrific help.

We look forward to seeing everyone in 10 moons. 'Til then, congratulations to all and remember that "Archers always shoot the bull."


CAMP KAWANHEE FOUNDATION


