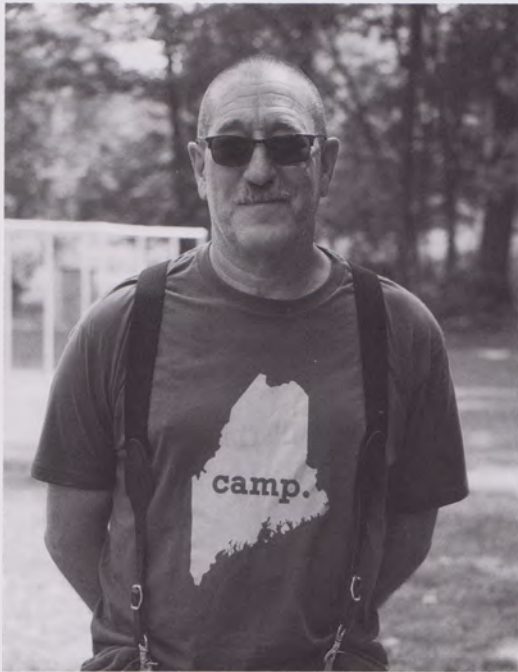

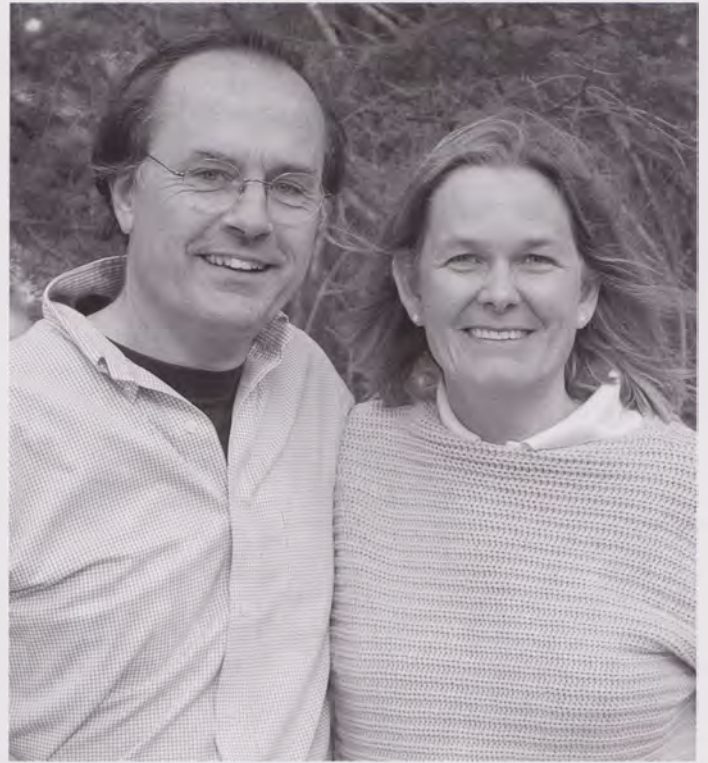

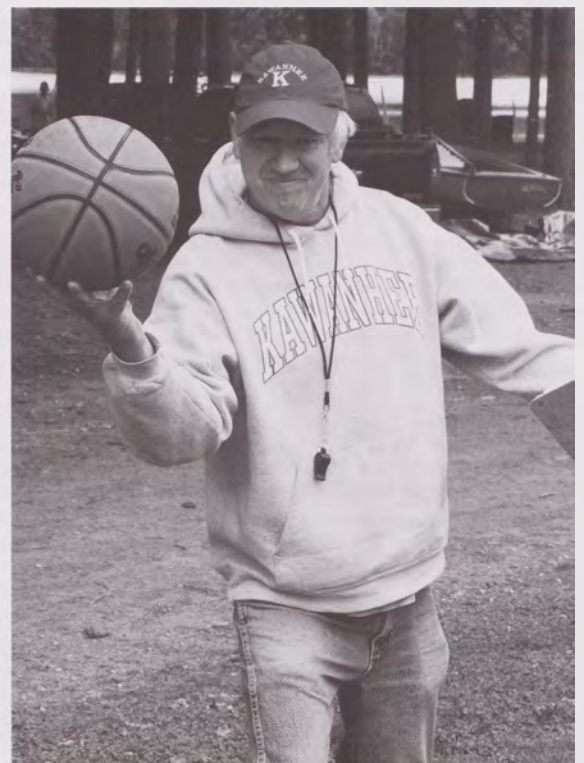

Food and Facilities

The Kawanhee Kitchen was again busy this year preparing healthy, varied meals for campers and staff. Prior to the arrival of the boys, the annual Town Dinner was held in the Estabrook Dining Hall. Counselors, staff and invited community members gathered to celebrate yet another season of camp. The arrival of the many campers on opening Sunday featured our Welcome to Maine meal with lobster rolls, clam chowder, baked beans, red hot dogs and Maine blueberry cake. Lobster was again the focus at the end of the fourth week with a lobsters and steamers buffet at the foot of the dining hall stairs. Scooter Libby brought his smoker to Kawanhee during the fifth week and slow roasted beef, pork and turkey for the entire camp community. Each Sunday during camp, the kitchen put out either a steak or a turkey dinner for the noon meal. In addition to all of these special meals, the kitchen staff prepared and served breakfast, lunch and dinner three meals a day for eight weeks. The campers lead busy and active lives while at Kawanhee and our goal in the kitchen is to make sure that every boy gets plenty of nutritious food at each meal. Vegetarian and gluten free options are now a regular part of the Kawanhee meal plan. Weld-produced maple syrup is available every morning and a local farmer provides us daily with fresh picked greens that complement those harvested from our own Kawanhee garden. As always, we welcome suggestions as to how we can make the dining experience at camp even stronger. May there always be a kitchen at Kawanhee!

WILDERNESS LIVING AND CONSERVATION

Nine springs ago was an exciting one for the **Campcraft**, **Tripping** and **Nature** departments. We sought to evaluate the independent program of each activity and bring all three under a more unified umbrella known as Wilderness Living and Conservation, as these three disciplines wonderfully complement one another. While Tripping, Campcraft and Nature remain three different activities with their own sets of level systems, we took a long look at the wide array of information each activity plans to teach, the manner in which they construct and implement their lessons throughout the camp season as well as each activity's utilization of our unbelievable natural setting on the shores of Lake Webb and in the mountains and rivers of western Maine.

Nature and Stewardship at Camp Kawanhee

For decades, summer camps such as Camp Kawanhee have served as safe havens where young children can learn in a safe and healthy environment. As it stands, tucked away in a cove on beautiful Lake Webb, surrounded by awe-inspiring mountains, Kawanhee has a unique ability to teach the upcoming generation of young men about something that has inextricably become a part of the rest of their lives: environmental stewardship.

So what exactly is Camp Kawanhee doing to prepare young men to become protectors of the planet that they will soon inherit? Of the eighteen activities that Kawanhee offers to its campers, three of them are dedicated to teaching campers about natural living. They are: the tripping department, campcraft, and nature.

For years, the tripping department has sought to bring boys out into the Maine wilderness, introducing them to the wonders that are hidden away in the natural world. On their hikes up nearby Tumbledown or famous Katahdin, the tripping department has always emphasized the importance of respecting trails and campgrounds by encouraging campers to adhere to the principles of "Leave No Trace".

Campcraft seeks to teach children that there is a way to live off of the land, and to become more self-reliant for things like food and shelter by teaching the basics of axemanship, fire making, and cooking. And through campcraft, young men fourteen years or older are able to participate in the Junior Maine Guide program, which teaches campers all the basics that they need to know in order to bring a group of people out into the Maine wilderness, and survive on the land. This program also teaches about the current environmental issues specific to Maine and different ways to approach alleviating them.

Campers aged sixteen and seventeen will be enrolled in the Leadership Training Program during which they will be expected to complete various projects around camp to better the community. In the past many of these have roots in envi-

ronmental stewardship including creating pathways through the woods to limit the literal and metaphorical footstep of Kawanhee in the surrounding forest. Another recent project was the planting of red pine trees throughout the campus.

More recently, the Nature program has instituted a new system of levels. Each of these new levels involves a set of activities devoted to stewardship (along with activities focused on observation and interaction with nature). These activities involve picking up trash around camp, helping to collect food scraps after meals for composting, working in the camp garden, advocating for nature in the lodge or in the larger camp community, and completing a stewardship-based project for themselves or for camp (such as trying a vegetarian diet for a week, or building a recycling center).

There are a myriad of ways in which Kawanhee excels in educating its campers about stewardship of the natural world, but it also has certain shortcomings. While camp preaches the importance of limiting waste through composting and returning bottles and cans, we are two decades into the 21st century and still Kawanhee has not found an efficient way to recycle cardboard and paper recycling is non-existent here. And while there has been a recent push for a better vegetarian menu, nearly every meal still consists heavily of red meat with a high price of greenhouse gas emissions.

The younger generations of our world will live in an age marked by the ceaseless struggle to quell environmental issues. We are leaving behind the age when it was, regarding the immediate survival of the human race, "okay" to live life unaware of the massive, negative roles that our industrial and post-industrial societies play in our ecosystems. We are living in the age in which it is an absolute necessity that we all take responsibility for the health of our world. We are living in the age in which it is vitally important that we teach people how to live as environmental stewards. And hopefully Kawanhee will continue to adapt so that it can remain an institution that brings hope to that world.

WILDERNESS LIVING AND CONSERVATION

Learning From Nature

Kawanhee is unusually rich in natural beauty, with plant and animal life in abundance. "Learning by doing" is the Kawanhee way and nowhere in camp is this more observed than in the Nature Department. Acquaintance with wild life is gained by caring for pets in the camp, pursuing birds on trips afield, and observation of the beaver colony a short distance from the camp. Frequent field trips to the local organic farm, to pan for gold, to microscopic observations, study of ferns and fungi, moth and butterfly propagation, nature photography and other fields of original research voluntarily chosen, are

open to boys who wish to become "Naturalists," the highest honor the department confers. Such activities aim to quicken appreciation, awaken interests and develop resources which will in many cases continue throughout the boy's life. Fishing is also an activity associated with this department. Campers have the opportunity to fish, learn about different species of fish and associated habitats, characteristics, and habits. If enough fish are caught, the campcraft department has been known to hold a fish fry!

Campcraft—Junior Maine Guide

THE CAMPCRAFT program appeals to boys who enjoy the fun of camping out. Preparation for trips is an important part of the program—learning the safety rules in cooking over an open fire—how to make rainproof shelters and comfortable bough beds—how to make and follow trails through the deep woods—how to fish, and the best bait to use.

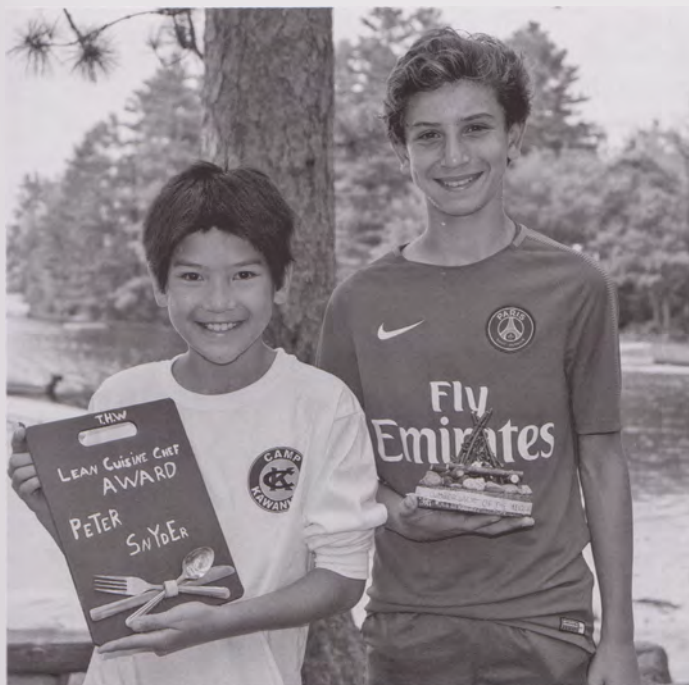
THE 2018 JUNIOR MAINE GUIDE candidates got right to work on the first day of camp sharpening axes, splitting wood, and learning the principal lakes and mountains, cities and parks of Maine. They practiced foretelling the weather by looking at the clouds, they discussed the state's ice fishing and wilderness regulations. They practiced triangulation with a map and compass, drew up trip equipment lists, and practiced the Wet Day Fire—that brutal test in which they have 20 minutes to boil water with only an axe, a knife, some matches and a wet cedar log. But JMG is not just about individual preparation for a week of testing at the Philips Preserve in Oquossoc alongside 70+ other campers from across the state—its most important aspect is the teamwork it requires from every participant, so that the trip goes smoothly. To practice, the boys went on an overnight canoe trip on the St. Croix river in the eastern part of the state and they also set up camp across the lake at Skookemie for several days. Their campsites and their meals were severely inspected by the many alumni and friends of the JMG program as they spent the last few days cramming for Testing Week. We received a highly complimentary letter from the testing staff, praising the boys for their citizenship and deportment. The Junior Maine Guide award is Kawanee's highest honor: congratulations to Alec, Ethan, Paul, Jose, and Gian Carlo! And many thanks to Grant and the Campcraft staff for making this summer's JMG program a great success!

TRIP PROGRAM



Kawanhee's 2018 tripping program was a huge success thanks to the leadership of Alex Standen, Jamie Bolon, Eddie Traynor, and Juanki Samalot! Every boy who came to camp this summer had the opportunity to summit one of our local mountains—with dozens of boys hiking a mountain for the first time in their lives. One highlight was a hike up Little Jackson Mountain—just across the lake from Kawanhee—followed by a bushwhack down to Tumbledown's iconic Crater Lake for a swim. Another was a hike up Cranberry Mountain, where boys are rewarded at the top by spectacular views of the Bigelow Range and Flagstaff Lake. Every boy at camp also had the opportunity to explore a local river spot, complete with natural pools and slides for the boys to enjoy.

Two groups of Kawanhees made the journey to Monhegan Island this summer to swim in the cold ocean water, explore a shipwreck, traverse beautiful oceanside cliffs, and complete a community service project on the island. Three other groups hiked Mount Katahdin, Maine's tallest and most glorious mountain, and a rite of passage for boys at Kawanhee. A group of our junior counselors paddled 50 miles down the remote and invigorating Allagash River, sleeping and preparing their meals

each night on the banks of the waterway. Another group of boys backpacked 25 miles through Grafton Notch State Park, carrying with them everything they needed to thrive in the wilderness. Every boy at Kawanhee was encouraged to challenge himself physically and emotionally, refine his wilderness skills, and collaborate with his peers in pursuit of a common goal: to enjoy and take care of each other and the natural world.

Ropes Course

Kawanhee's Challenge Course, which encompasses a 40 foot climbing tower and multiple high and low elements, was constructed by Project Adventure before the 2000 camp season. The course is a model of experiential learning that involves participants in a variety of group and individual activities aimed at developing group trust, problem-solving skills, and cooperation within a team.

In addition, it provides individuals with opportunities that focus on personal challenge and constructive risk taking as ways to build a healthy self-concept. An integral component of the program is the "Challenge By Choice" concept which empowers participants to make decisions that are correct for them while utilizing this completely safe environment with trained professional leaders. 2018 brought with it the final installment of a 3-year upgrade, with additions to and improvements of the Ropes Course. The campers really enjoyed

the new elements and challenges these offered.

Kawanhee Shop

Craftsmen of 2018

Under the able leadership of Adam Bruder, Marco Nardone, Stu Lipkowitz, and Rosaura Rodriquez, Kawanhee's Shop Program is one of our busiest and most popular. Shop is organized to provide campers with information and valuable knowledge related to woodworking and its fundamental aspects. The instruction provided includes: Learning the Names of Tools; Recognizing the 3 living principles in each tool: FORM or its shape, size and parts, FUNCTION or its range of uses, and the PERFORMANCE or techniques needed for it to work properly. We also strive to help campers know wood as a material with all its properties and characteristics and develop and encourage an appreciation for where it

comes from and the process used to bring it to the form where we can begin to create projects from it. Learning and practicing skills for working with wood include cutting techniques, joinery, correct measuring, squaring boards, recognition and practice of methods to address unwanted characteristics of wood when attempting to create a product. Instruction is provided through workshops that are integrated into activity periods. Boys are guided through techniques both individually and as a group, depending upon the project that they are undertaking. There is a wide range of possible projects for boys to choose and if a boy has an original idea, there is opportunity to pursue that as well.

The Leadership Training Program

This summer's Leadership Training Program was composed of 18 Junior Counselors (J.C.'s) of which 11 were second year J.C.'s (17 yrs. old) and 7 were first year J.C.'s (16 yrs. old). This past summer the main goals of this two-year program included tapping into the empowerment of J.C.'s as capable young men, the development of leadership skills in varying contexts and the opportunity to discover and refine one's personal leadership style. The first and second year J.C.'s each had different opportunities to realize these goals. The first year J.C.'s held on to many more camper benefits, whereas the second year J.C.'s dropped in to the counselor role much more fully from the onset of the season. Second year J.C.'s moved straight into lodges in a counseling role, and instructed in an activity, from the get go. On the other hand, first year J.C.'s resided in a lodge, along with the other first year J.C.'s, for a two week period as they proved their preparedness for in-lodge counseling. As these protocols reveal, the program bears a heavy liminal quality; J.C.'s are never quite treated fully as any of the two roles they are transitioning between: camper and counselor.

What truly marks one's transition from camper to counselor is the degree to which a genuine drive to serve and give back to camp is potentialized. J.C.'s were offered countless opportunities to actively tap into this drive and experiment with it throughout the season. The main arenas for doing so were: co-residence with campers in a lodge as an intern counselor of sorts, instruction during at least two one-hour periods per weekday within a camp activity, development and assumption of specialized leadership roles and community service projects with a camp-wide impact, wilderness trips, individual supervision and weekly workshops with peer supervision.

Within this general framework, two specific focuses of leadership development were emphasized this summer: freedom to sensitively choose the medium of service and inclusivity. The process of selecting specialized leadership roles and community service projects was heavily informed by this freedom of choice. It was

promoted as a way for J.C.'s to tune-in to their personal strengths and gifts while also attuning to the needs of the camp environment. The hope was that J.C.'s would find an intersection between their gifts and a camp need, which would then inform the development of their specialized leadership role. This definitely took place in most all J.C.'s experiences this summer! Whether it was Kai creating and taking on the role of "Director of Swag", Grant with his role as "J.C. Representative", or Alec spearheading the efforts to rebuild a lean-to at New-Moose Outpost across the lake, J.C.'s were leaving an impact across camp in a way that honored their personal interests as they were employed in the service of camp. Inclusivity was addressed during weekend workshops and group discussions. Being the bedrock that it is for camper immersion and retention, inclusivity was explored as a skill requiring continual self-examination, humility and curiosity.

J.C.'s also got to go on several multi-day trips in the outdoors of Maine. Whether it was the second year J.C.'s paddling down the Allagash Wilderness Waterway for four days, three days backpacking Grafton Notch with the first year J.C.'s, or a community service trip to Monhegan Island in the Atlantic Ocean, J.C.'s were getting exposure.

The overall success of the program this summer was possible due to the audacity and passion that these young men brought forth. It was truly inspiring to witness young men discover their power and capability from such proximity; especially when they do so in pursuit of noble and selfless aims. Kawanhee's 2019 season counts on an exemplary batch of first year Senior Counselors that completed the Leadership Training Program last summer, and on a group of second year J.C.'s who are ready to lead by example within the program. Truly, however, the merits of these young men's efforts within the program cannot be circumscribed to camp culture only, for they surely extend into the homes, schools and communities of these J.C.'s lives outside of Kawanhee, as they should.

Camp Kawanhee has just finished up its 98th consecutive camp season as it rolls on to 2019 and its centennial celebration a year later. The summer of 2018 featured a diverse and full complement of campers; boys from afar (including places like Spain, England and Switzerland) took up with guys from 22 states scattered across the continent to form a spirited and cohesive community dedicated to friendship, fun and learning by doing. The 190 campers of the 2018 season included many sons, grandsons and nephews of alumni, and they were mentored by counselors whose names many Kawanhee alums would recognize (Altmaier, Birch, Detrick, Duncan and Rullan, to name but a few). In keeping with past practice, most of our lodge counselors were campers themselves for several summers, and so were well-positioned to help carry the torch as stewards of Kawanhee's traditions and quirky joy. Over 30 of our 2018 campers received financial aid. Almost half of these recipients were sponsored by the John Austin Cheley Foundation, a Colorado charity that provides a summer camp experience to those who could not otherwise afford it. Kawanhee is one of only nine youth camps across the country chosen by the Cheley Foundation to host its grant recipients.

So much about the Kawanhee experience is just as an alum would remember it: the warm glow of Saturday evening campfires, the bracing chill of Polar Bear swims, the rigorous hike up Tumbledown, the tenacity of a Maroon-Grey tug-of-war, the singular smells and sounds of stately pines, a night sky featuring countless stars. But it's also true that Kawanhee is moving boldly ahead with a view toward ensuring a prosperous and relevant future. In just the last few years, Kawanhee's facilities have been improved and expanded significantly. It's difficult to believe that the "new" athletic field and basketball court are already six years old. Since then, camp has built a commodious director's cabin, added new housing for at least a dozen staff, completed a three-year build-out of its ropes course, added new fleets of sailing dinghies and expedition canoes, established the Kawanhee History Museum, and completed other meaningful enhancements too numerous to mention. As we write this, another project, more ambitious than those mentioned above, looms in front of us. The restoration of the Rec Hall is underway and will continue through the off-season.

Along with Kawanhee's recent focus on facilities, it is also engaged in a robust strategic planning exercise as the camp enters its second century. The goal is to continue to offer a camp experience that is as responsive as it can be to the needs of our families.

To our current Kawanhee families, we say thank you for entrusting your sons, brothers, grandsons to us for the summer. To Kawanhee alums of all eras, we hope to see you at Kawanhee's Centennial celebration in August of 2020.
